

A. VON ENDE IS DEAD

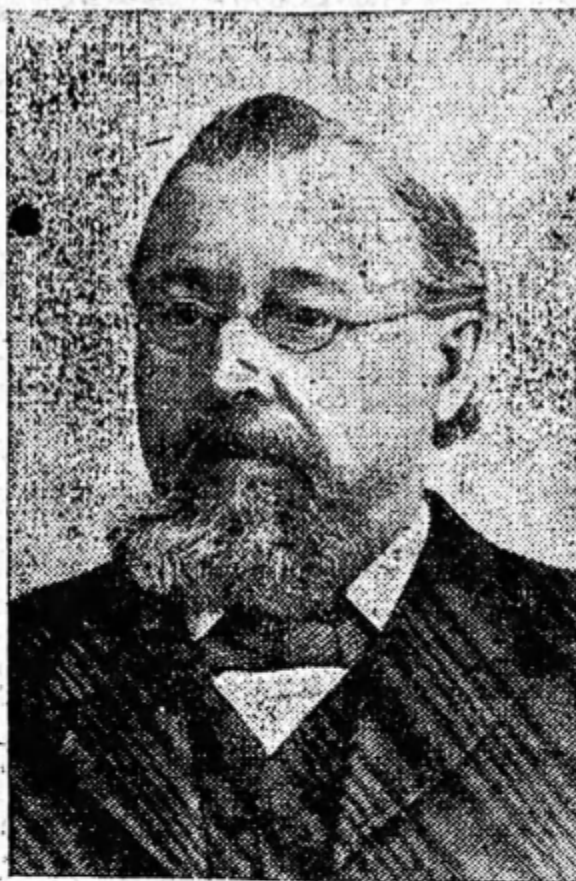
He Was a Pioneer German Resident
of Minneapolis.

HIS FATHER WAS A NOBLEMAN

Ruined by Napoleonic Wars, He
Brought His Family to
This Country.

August von Ende, a pioneer resident of Minnesota, died at his home, 902 Fifth street N, this morning. Announcement of the funeral cannot be made until a son and daughter, now in San Francisco, can be heard from.

Last week Mr. von Ende went out to the cemetery and discussed plans for beautifying the grave of his wife who died about a year ago. On Monday Mr. von

Ende did not get up for breakfast; nor did he leave his room from that time until death came. He was 73 years old.

August von Ende was born in Germany, in 1829, but came to Minnesota and settled at St. Anthony before Minneapolis was heard of. His grandfather was a German nobleman whose estates were confiscated during the Napoleonic invasion. Mr. von Ende was educated in the common schools at Emmenrode, Germany. When he was 17 years old his father emigrated to this country. The family remained in Baltimore for a time and then went to St. Louis where young von Ende secured a place as waiter in a hotel and where he was married to Miss Amalia Rey. After his marriage he removed to Freeport, Ill., and opened a restaurant there.

In 1855 he came to St. Anthony where he opened the Farmers' Hotel. Eight years later the hotel was moved across the river. It continued under his management until 1882 when he sold the hotel business but retained the property on which the hotel still stands. In recent years Mr. von Ende had made a business of real estate. He served two terms in the state legislature, having been elected on the republican ticket. He was the last surviving charter member of Robert Blum lodge, I. O. O. F.

Mrs. von Ende died about a year ago. They had nine children, Mrs. A. H. Runge, Mrs. William Baehr, Edward von Ende, Mrs. John C. Wunder, Mrs. Louise Sievers, Mrs. August Doer, Julius von Ende, Charles von Ende and Adolf von Ende. Mrs. Wunder and Charles von Ende are now in San Francisco.

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
