F. A. Duxbury Dies, Aged 70

Former State Senator and Industrial Commissioner Succumbs in St. Paul

F. A. Duxbury, former state senator and for 10 years chairman of the state industrial commission, died last night at St. Luke's hospital, St. Paul, after a long illness. He will be buried at Caledonia, Minn., his old home. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Mr. Duxbury was born April 11, 1862, in Harmony township, Fillmore county, Minn., and attended public schools in that county, graduating from Preston high school. He aught school for 10 years and then was admitted to the bar in 1895, tractising at Caledonia. He was married in 1884 to Susan Addison Duxbury, who died in 1921.

Mr. Duxbury was elected to the state senate in 1910, and served sight years in that body. In 1921 he was named as first chairman of the state industrial commission, and served by successive reappointments until May 1, 1931. Since that time he had practised law in St. Paul. He served in 1922 as president of the International Association of Industrial Accident Boards and Commissions.

Mr. Duxbury is survived by his second wife, Edna, and three chiliren, Francis Adelbert, Jr., John and Jane; also two sons by his first wife, Lloyd of Caledonia, Minn., and Leland S. of Minneapolis, and six prothers and sisters, Mrs. Fred McJowan, Fort Washakie, Wyo., Mrs. Albert Daniels, Minneapolis; W. R. Duxbury, St. Paul; F. R. Duxbury, Danbury, Wis. Leslie Duxbury, Osage, Iowa, and Newton Duxbury, Preston, Minn.
