F. A. DUXBURY RITES TODAY

Former State Industrial Commissioner Will Be Buried at Caledonia.

Funeral services for F. A. Duxbury, former member of the state industrial commission, will be conducted at the Damphier-Baird mortuary, 288 West Fifth street, St. Paul, at 10 a. m. Wednesday, and at the Methodist Episcopal church at Caledonia, Minn., at 2 p. m. Thursday, under auspices of the Masonic lodge. Burial will be at Caledonia.

Mr. Duxbury died Monday at St. Luke's hospital, St. Paul. He was 70 years old.

His career as a public official, which began when he became a state senator from the first Minnesota district in 1911, was ended when Mr. Duxbury was forced out of the state industrial commission by Governor Olson two years ago.

Serving in the 1911, 1913, 1915 and 1917 sessions of the state legislature, he retired in 1918, but three years later was appointed as one of the three original members of the industrial commission, created by the 1921 legislature.

After leaving the commission, Mr. Duxbury, who was an attorney, represented persons interested in compensation matters before the organization and was engaged in this work at the time of his death.

Mr. Duxbury was married twice and was the father of five children. In 1885 he was married to Susan Ann Addison, who died in 1921. The children born of this marriage were Lloyd of Caledonia and Leland S. of Minneapolis. His second marriage was to Edna Wienerslage and three children were born to them. They are Francis Adelbert, John and Jane.

In addition to his five children, Mr. Duxbury is survived by his second wife; two sisters, Mrs. Fred McGowan of Fort Washakie, Wyo., and Mrs. Albert Daniels of Minneapolis, and four brothers, W. R. Duxbury of St. Paul, F. R. Duxbury of Danbury, Wis., Leslie Duxbury of Osage, Iowa, and Newton Duxbury of Preston, Minn.
