## CIVIL WAR VETERAN IS CALLED

Hugh H. B. McMaster, Pioneer and Legislator, Passes to Long Rest.

Hugh H. B. McMaster, veteran of the war of the rebellion, sergeant-major of Company G., First regiment, Minnesota heavy artillery, died at the Soldiers' home in Dayton, O., Thursday.

He was 67 years old.

Mr. McMaster came to Minnesota with his parents in 1857, locating at Read's Landing, Wabasha county. He enlisted in 1864 and saw service with his regiment until the close of the war. Returning to Read's, he engaged in steamboating and merchandising. He was elected a representative to the state legislature in 1880 as a Republican, though from one of the strong Democratic districts. In 1881 he re-moved to Eau Claire, Wis., where he continued in the cerchandise business and where he held several county offices. Later Mr. McMaster entered the employ of the federal government, removing to Washington, D. C. About four years ago he was stricken with apoplexy, and this was ultimately the cause of his death.

As a member of the Minnesota Territorial Pioneers' association, he was known to many old settlers throughout the state and was personally acquainted with all the older members of the Read's Landing association of the

Twin Cities.

Mr. McMaster is survived by three relatives in Minneapolis, a sister, Mrs. Fred A. Bill, 2203 Lyndale avenue north, and two nieces, Mrs. W. T. Neill, 1323 Fourth street southeast, and Mrs. H. B. Higgins, 2812 Fifteenth avenue south.

The interment took place at Dayton yesterday.
