

GEN. EDMUND M. POPE DEAD

PUBLIC EXAMINER UNDER GOVERNOR LIND, AND WELL-KNOWN CITIZEN DIES AT GRAND MARAIS.

General Edmund M. Pope, public examiner in the administration of Governor John Lind, 1899-1901, died yesterday at his home in Grand Marais, Minn., where he conducted an abstract office and was also engaged in the lumber business.

General Pope is survived by a wife, a son in Port Townsend, Wash., and a daughter, Mrs. Benjamin Taylor, in Mankato, his former home.

General Pope was born in Monroe county, New York, 68 years ago. He there received an academic and commercial college education. When the civil war broke out he entered the service of the union as captain of Company A, Eighth New York volunteers. He was promoted to colonel of the regiment and later, toward the close of the war, was made brevet brigadier general. He was a personal friend of General Custer.

He came to Minnesota in 1873. He served in the state senate from 1887 to 1891. At the close of his term as public examiner under Governor Lind he became connected with the Citizens' Savings bank of St. Paul. He went to Grand Marais several years ago and built up a successful business.
