RESOLUTION.

Messrs. Johnson, G. W., Scribner and Anderson, A. G., offered the following resolution:

Whereas, Almighty God in His infinite wisdom, called from our midst the Honorable William L. Bernard, who served the State of Minnesota, his district and the city of Duluth, in a courageous, conscientious and

able manner. He was born in Bloomington, Minnesota, in 1862, and after having lived a number of years in St. Paul moved to Duluth in 1894 and resided in that city until his death on May 23, 1928. He served with distinction as Alderman in the Council in the city of Duluth for two terms, and for ten years in the House of Representatives during the years 1915 to 1923. He was not a candidate for re-election to the 1925 and 1927, Legislatures, but had filed as a candidate for the present Session of the Legislature only a few weeks before his death.

Whereas, in his death the State lost a faithful servant true to his trusts, being ever eager to help make the operation of government responsive to the true will of the people. To those who knew him he was an earnest and sincere friend, his fellowship and loyalty endeared him to all who worked with him, his whole life being marked by genial friendship, kindly actions, wholehearted regard for the principles in which he believed, and unswerving devotion to the best interests of his city, state and nation.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the House of Representatives hereby officially declares its sense of loss in his untimely death, and extends its deepest sympathy to his bereaved family, and that this resolution as adopted be sent to his family as a token of our action, and as a mark of our esteem and affection for our departed friend and brother; and

Be It Further Resolved, that the Chief Clerk be and is hereby authorized to have an engrossed copy of this resolution and the same be sent to the family of the deceased.
