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A tireless legislator and devoted worker

two weeks ago, senior legislative staffers and officials for the Minnesota Historical Society assembled a list of eight Minnesotans who had lain in state in the State Capitol rotunda before Stassen. Omitted from that list was state Sen. Fay George Child, who died of a heart attack on April 2, 1965, while speaking on a bill in a committee meeting.

Child, who represented a western respected senator Minnesota district, was a newspaper from Maynard, died publisher who served more than 14 years in office in 1965. in the Senate. He was a Farmer-Labor ac-

tivist early in life but was a member of the Conservative caucus as a senator, said his daughter, Sandy Hamilton.

Child was known for his ability to get along with all factions and had an "irreverent" sense of humor, she said. Antique printing equipment from the newspaper he published in Maynard, Minn., is still on display at the State Fair's Heritage Village. A legislator paying homage to Child in 1967 noted that he was "a tireless legislator and devoted worker," and that he lay in state "as witness to the high respect and esteem" in which his colleagues held him.
