Which was referred to the Committee on Rules.

Mr. Dalen introduced the following resolution:

Whereas, Almighty God in His wisdom, has called from our midst, the Honorable George Wicker of Evanston, Illinois, who served as a member of the House during the sessions of 1919 and 1921, from Dodge County, and who has been very active in the organization of the farm co-operative movement in this State, and who, the last two years has held executive position in the Triple A at Washington, D. C., and,

Whereas, In his contact with his fellowmen he was ever earnest, sincere, congenial, and kind, and, in public life wholeheartedly devoted to the service of the best interest of the State:

Therefore, Be It Resolved, By the House of Representatives of Minnesota that it hereby expresses its regrets at his untimely death, and expresses its deep sympathy to the bereaved family, and that a copy of the resolution be sent to the family, as a mark of our esteem and as a token of affection for the comrade and friend, and

Be It Further Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and hereby is instructed to send an engrossed copy of this resolution to the family of the deceased.

Mr. Dalen moved adoption of the foregoing resolution.

Which motion prevailed and the resolution was unanimously adopted by rising vote.

Mr. Crissey presented a resolution of the Bible Class of the Methodist Sunday School at Chokio, Minnesota, of which the Honorable R. W. Keeler, former member of this House from Stevens County, is the Leader, and moved that it be read and printed in the Journal.

Which motion prevailed and it was so ordered.

RESOLUTION AGAINST WAR.

We have seen the human wreckage that war sends back to our homes, the unbearable grief of parents whose sons never returned or returned physical wrecks, the breaking up of the moral ideals of the nation and the sweeping away of the lifetime savings of millions of our people as some of the hideous results of war.

It is our belief that our President and the Congress should never again ask our people for such a sacrifice as the last war called upon them to make, that our President and the Congress must find some other method of settling international disputes than by gage of battle. If our President and the Congress feel that this would be impossible, let them enact legislation that will draft every person and all of the resources of the nation for the prosecution of the war, and provide that no person be
