H. F. No. 956, A bill for an act to amend Chapter 455, General Laws of Minnesota for 1919, being an act entitled, "An act to prohibit the manufacture, sale, disposition or transportation of, or the keeping or having in possession for sale, disposition or transportation, or the soliciting, receiving or taking any order for intoxicating liquor, except for certain purposes, and to regulate the manufacture, sale, disposition, transportation, possession and use of intoxicating liquor for such purposes and to provide for the enforcement of such prohibition and to provide for the suspension of laws inconsistent herewith in certain cases, to define nuisances and provide for the abatement thereof and the injunction of the person creating, keeping, or maintaining or aiding in the same and providing penalties for violations of this act," and to amend Section 1 thereof, as amended by Chapter 65, Extra Session Laws of Minnesota 1919, and Section 2, and Section 3 as amended by said Chapter 65, and Section 4, Section 5, Section 8, Section 11, Section 14, Section 16, Section 20, Section 21, Section 23, Section 24 and Section 25, all of said chapter.

RESOLUTION OF CONDOLENCE.

Messrs. Oren, Curtis, Jacobson, Ross, Grove and Christensen, A., offer the following resolution and move its adoption:

Whereas, Death has called H. H. Emmons, a member of this House of Representatives, causing grief and sorrow among the members of this body; and

Whereas, In his untimely death we feel a keen sympathy for his family, and for ourselves a great bereavement;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, By this House of Representatives of the Minnesota Legislature, that we, through this means, give expression to our appreciation of his admirable character and to our sorrow at the loss his family, his friends and the public have sustained by reason of his untimely death.

And Be It Further Resolved, That these resolutions be printed in the Journal of the House and that the Chief Clerk transmit a copy thereof to the family of the deceased.

We realize how futile are any words of ours in an hour like this, yet we know those to whom he was near and dear have the blessed assurance that there is one to whom they may turn in their hour of darkest despair who will alleviate their grief and wipe away tears in the anticipation of that blessed reunion from which there shall be no parting and where sorrow, sickness and death shall be no more.

Not alone to the immediate family and this community is the death of Mr. Emmons a great loss. In his departure the House of Representatives and State of Minnesota mourn with you. Mr. Emmons, by his untiring energy, zeal and conscientious application to his work in the Legislature rendered a real service and his untimely death is to us a loss keenly felt, for men of his type are sorely needed in a day when so many complex problems demand solution. As a man who fully realized the responsibility of the trust placed in him by his constituents, zealously guarding every interest and actively espousing every cause for the advancement of the physical and spiritual well being of the people of our state, yet withal humble and unassuming, Mr. Emmons had endeared himself to his fellow members to a very marked degree, and his pronounced good judgment, mature delibera-

tion and good common sense, made his counsel and advice very valuable.

At the opening of the present session his friends from the former session noticed the impairment of his health, yet his cheerful disposition and hopefulness buoyed up his spirits so that he bore up under the strain, and he was reluctant to follow the advice of his friends and the doctors to give up his attendance upon his legislative duties and return home where loving hands could administer to his wants and comfort him, and where proper medical attention might be given. Even as late as the middle of March, members were surprised by his appearance to take part in our deliberation on one of the paramount issues of the session. It was now apparent that his condition was becoming critical as one could not fail to observe that the disease from which he was suffering was slowly but surely getting the upper hand, so that although not unlooked for, yet the announcement of his demise was a pronounced shock, bringing grief and sorrow to his many friends at the Capitol who had learned to admire him and hold him in high esteem for his many sterling qualities.

The passage of Holy Writ upon which President Harding took his oath of office might well have been chosen as the life motto of our departed friend, Mr. Emmons, where we read, "What doth the Lord require of thee but to do justly and love mercy and to walk humbly with Thy God."
