#### RESOLUTION.

*Whereas*, Honorable H. J. Farmer, a member of the House of Representatives during the sessions of 1923, 1925 and 1927, departed this life at Pipestone, Minnesota, on June 4, 1928, at the age of seventy-five years; and

*Whereas*, his life was an example and an inspiration for the present and succeeding generations in this state—born of sturdy New England ancestry at Canton, St. Lawrence County, New York, July 8, 1853, where he spent his boyhood and where he attended the public schools and Canton Academy and taught school until 1883, when he settled upon a quarter section of land in Pipestone County, Minnesota; and

*Whereas*, he was elected and served as County Commissioner of Pipestone County for several terms, and as County Treasurer, and conducted said offices with honor and distinction; and

*Whereas*, he was a charter member, director, secretary, and president at the time of his death of the State Association of Grain Dealers and was president of the Association of Mutual Fire Insurance Companies,

and always exhibited a deep interest and great industry in and intelligent direction of business and civic enterprises in his community and in the State; and

*Whereas*, in his contacts with his fellowmen he was always earnest, sincere, congenial and kindly, and in public life whole-heartedly devoted to the best interests of the State;

*Now Therefore, Be It Resolved*, by the House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota, that it hereby declares its sense of loss at his death and extends its deepest sympathy to his bereaved family, and that an engrossed copy of this resolution as adopted be sent to the family as a mark of our esteem and affection for our colleague.

Which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.
