
## SUE M. DICKEY HOUGH

Mrs. Sue M. Dickey Hough, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thaddeus Stevens Dickey, Minneapolis, was born at Lancaster, Pa., where her grandfather and uncle, John Dickey and Colonel Oliver J. Dickey both served in the house and senate of Pennsylvania and later in congress. An uncle, Adams Dickey, went to California in 1849, and after procuring a fortune, settled in North Dakota. It was from him that Dickey county, North Dakota, received its name. Another uncle, Major Charles Dickey, was stationed at Fort Snelling during Indian warfare. Five uncles served in the Civil War. Mrs. Hough was graduated from Central High school, Minneapolis, and later went East to a finishing school and then studied law. For four years she lived in Chicago. While there she devoted a great part of her time to settlement and charity work and to the Red Cross. She was president of two literary clubs and interested in suffrage. Mrs. Hough returned to Minneapolis in 1916 and opened her own offices where she deals in farm lands, city real estate and investments. In 1923 she served in the state legislature\_as representative of the thirty-fourth district.



Mrs. Hough served in the Minnesota House during the 1923 session, one of the first women in the state to do so. She was defeated by I. E. Brophey in the 1924 general election.
