MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS—CONTINUED.

Mr. McNulty offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS.

Messrs. Barker, Hagen, E., Hagen, G., Kinzer and Ost introduced—

H. F. No. 1, A bill for an act raising revenues imposing a tax on conducting business by the system of chain stores for selling or otherwise disposing of goods, wares, articles or commodities at retail, with certain exceptions, providing for the assessment and collection thereof and for the distribution of the proceeds therefrom, providing penalties for failure to pay such tax, defining certain crimes in connection with the enforcement of such tax, appropriating money for the administration of this act and for making refunds and repealing Laws 1933, Chapter 213, as amended by Extra Session Laws 1933-34, Chapter 16.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules.

Messrs. Barker, Hagen, E., Hagen, G., Kinzer and Ost introduced—

H. F. No. 2, A bill for an act to amend Mason's Minnesota Statutes of 1927, Sections 2272, 2274, 2278, 2268, 2289, 2290, and 2290-1, relating to the rate of gross earnings tax upon freight line companies, sleeping car companies, express companies and trust companies.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules.

H. F. No. 3, A bill for an act to impose a gross earnings tax upon telegraph companies, and repealing certain inconsistent acts.

H. F. No. 4, A bill for an act to amend Mason's Minnesota Statutes of 1927, Section 2286, relating to tax on gross earnings of telephone companies and fixing the percentage of tax under certain conditions.
