No. 236, A bill for an act authorizing the renewal of the period of corporate existence of domestic insurance companies or corporations having no capital stock, and legalizing acts and contracts of such corporations made or done and performed subsequent to the expiration of the original period of existence of such corporations.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Messrs. Halsted and Schwanke introduced—

H. F. No. 237, A bill for an act amending Mason's Supplement 1940, Section 8992-174; relating to insane, inebriate, feeble-minded, and epileptic persons.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Messrs. Halsted and Schwanke introduced—

H. F. No. 238, A bill for an act amending Mason's Supplement 1940, Section 8992-184b relating to persons having a psychopathic personality.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Halsted introduced—

H. F. No. 239, A bill for an act relating to the repurchase of land after its forfeiture to the state for taxes.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Mr. Omtvedt introduced—

H. F. No. 240, A bill for an act authorizing certain cities of the fourth class and certain villages to appropriate money for the purpose of advertising and advancing their recreational or agricultural interests.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Municipal Affairs.

Messrs. Faimon and Prifrel introduced—

H. F. No. 241, A bill for an act relating to an income tax and taxes measured by income and amending Mason's Supplement 1940, Section 2394-6, Sub-division (b).

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Taxes.

Mr. Peterson, G. C., introduced—

H. F. No. 242, A bill for an act to appropriate money to Mrs. Louis Eastlund for damages sustained.

Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Claims.

#### THIRD READING OF SENATE BILLS.

S. F.
