Which was read for the first time and referred to the Committee on Rules.

GENERAL ORDERS.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, with Mr. Weeks in the chair.

After some time spent therein, the committee arose and the Speaker resumed the chair, whereupon Mr. Weeks reported that the committee had considered

H. F. No. 264, which it recommended be amended, as follows:
With reference to the printed bill:

Amend the title by striking out the word "Thereof" where it occurs after the word "Available" in line 4 and inserting in lieu of the same the word "Therefor". Also amend said title by striking out the colon occurring in line 4 and inserting a semicolon in lieu thereof.

Section 2, page 2, subdivision (c), strike out the word "pensioner" and insert in lieu thereof the word "recipient".

Section 4, page 4, subdivision (b), line 7, strike out the word "pensioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "recipients".

Section 4, page 4, subdivision (b), line 8, strike out the word "Pensions" and insert in lieu thereof the words "old age assistance".

Section 24, subdivision (c), page 14, line 22, after the word "sufficient" insert the word "tax".
