RECONVENED.

The House reconvened at 2:21 o'clock P. M., and was called to order by the Speaker.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS—CONTINUED.

Mr. Barker offered the following resolution :

*Whereas*, Honorable Ole A. Pikop, a member of the House of Representatives during the Sessions of 1915 and 1917, from the Forty-eighth Legislative District, Grant County, Minnesota, departed this life at Fergus Falls, Minnesota, on March 12, 1931, at the age of sixty-five years; and

*Whereas*, his life was an example and an inspiration for the present and succeeding generations in this State—born in Sigdal, Norway, in 1866, he came to the United States with his parents in 1869 and settled in Houston County, Minnesota. After a few years, he moved to Grant County, Minnesota, where he lived until the time of his death; and

*Whereas*, he was often honored by being elected to the various township offices and conducted said offices with honor and distinction; and

*Whereas*, he was one of the leading farmers of Grant County, for many years farming a section of land, and displayed great industry and exceptional ability and integrity in farm management and in the direction of business and civic enterprises in his community and in the State; and

*Whereas*, in his contacts with his fellowmen, he was always earnest, sincere, congenial and kindly, and in public life, whole-heartedly devoted to the best interests of the State;

*Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved*, by the House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota, that it hereby declares its sense of loss at his death and extends its deepest sympathy to his bereaved family, and that an engrossed copy of this resolution be sent to the family as a mark of our esteem and affection.

Mr. Dahle moved that the resolution be adopted.

Which motion prevailed unanimously by a rising vote.
