## DEATH OF PIONEER

Hans P. Huleback, Honored Citizen
and Pioneer of Locality, Passes
to His Reward.

Hans P. Hulebak, representative citizen and pioneer oft his locality, died at St. Lucas hospital, Faribault, Sunday, September 23, after a short illness. Deceased was eighty years old, being the last of ten brothers and sisters.

Hans P. Hulebak was born in Hemsedal, Hallingdal, Norway, August 28, 1843. In 1861 his parents, Paul and Barbara Hulebak, and their ten children emigrated to America, landing at Quebec, Canada, after a stormy voyage of several weeks in a sail boat. From there they went to Rock county, Wisconsin, practically a wilderness, where they settled. Here the father, Paul, and three sons, Christian, Even and Nels, and one daughter, Sigrid, died within a short time. The balance of the family removed shortly afterward to Goodhue county, Minnesota, settling on a homestead west of Kenyon, which has since been the home of the fam-

In June, 1877, deceased was united to Miss Anna K. Finnesgaard, who died September 15, 1915. To this union three children were born, two of whom are living, Paul on the home place, and Mrs. Harold H. Busswitz, of Austin.

Mr. Hulebak served his community in many offices of trust. He was a member of the state legislature for two terms, 1881 and 1883, and numerous township offices he filled to the entire satisfaction of the community. He was a charter member of the Kenyon Mutual Fire Insurance company, serving that company as secretary for nearly thirty years. He was a charter member of Gol congregation, and treasurer of that body for a number of years. He was a director of the Citizens State Bank of Kenyon.

Mr. Hulebak was blessed with a keen memory which he enjoyed to the very last. He was an intelligent reader of the daily and weekly press and particularly enjoyed reading historical books. Mr. Hulebak's large library was burned in the fire which decreased in the fire was well posted on things political and historical.

Mr. Hulebak's death came as a shock to hundreds of intimate friends gained by his cheery disposition and unfailing courage to do that which he thought and knew to be right. These friends mourn the passing of a courade.
