Each member who has moved from his usual place of lodging during a substantial part of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature shall be paid per diem living expenses in the amount of \$36 for each calendar day during the sessions of the 72nd Legislature.

Each member of the Senate who has not changed his place of lodging for a substantial part of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature shall be paid per diem living expenses in the amount of \$23 for each calendar day during the sessions of the 72nd Legislature.

Each member of the Senate shall certify in writing to the Secretary of the Senate prior to the issuance of the first of the warrants for each of the sessions of the 72nd Legislature whether or not he has moved from his usual place of lodging. Each member shall also certify in writing for the actual travel for which he seeks reimbursement.

The Secretary of the Senate shall prepare and issue warrants from the Senate legislative expense fund in payment of mileage and living expenses to each member of the Senate.

The money transferred pursuant to this section is appropriated for the purposes for which transferred. The commissioner of administration and the board of regents of the university of Minnesota shall report to the chairman of the house appropriations committee and the chairman of the senate finance committee on any transfer made pursuant to this section.

Sec. 17. [APPROPRIATIONS FOR CONSTRUCTION; FEDERAL MONEY; EXCEEDING AUTHORIZED COST.]

The commissioner of administration and the board of regents of the university of Minnesota shall apply for the maximum federal share for each capital improvement project for which money is appropriated by this act. Encumbrance or expenditure of money in excess of the project authorization shall be made only after the commissioner of administration and the board of regents, as appropriate, have consulted with the chairman of the house appropriations committee and the chairman of the senate finance committee and the chairmen have made their recommendations thereon. The recommendations are advisory only. Failure or refusal to make a recommendation promptly is deemed a negative recommendation.

Sec. 18. [METHODS OF ACQUISITION.]

Where money has been appropriated by this act to the commissioner of administration to acquire lands or sites for public buildings or real estate, acquisition may be by gift, purchase, or condemnation proceedings. Condemnation proceedings shall be pursuant to chapter 117.

Sec. 19. [CANCELLATION.]

For each appropriation made in this act, each project shall have completed the designer selection board process within 60 days, and shall be obligated by award of contract within 26 weeks. Those projects not meeting each of these requirements shall be abandoned and the appropriation shall immediately lapse and be cancelled to the state bond fund. If an extenuating condition arises, the governor may authorize the continuation of a project beyond the deadline only after consulting with the chairmen of the house appropriation and senate finance committees for their recommendation. The deadlines established shall be determined from the date of final enactment.

Sec. 20. [EFFECTIVE DATE.]

This act is effective the day following final enactment. "
