S. F. No. 2, Joint resolution ratifying article fifteenth of the Constitution of the United States,

Was read the first time.

On motion of Mr. Swift,

The rules were suspended, and the bill read the second and third times and put upon its final passage.

The question being taken upon the passage of the bill, there were yeas 28, and nays 15, as follows:

So the bill was passed and its title agreed to.

Was read the first time and referred to the committee on judiciary.

On motion of Mr. Waterman, the report of the committee on joint rules was adopted.

General orders having been reached, the House was resolved into committee of the whole,

Mr. Norris in the Chair.

After some time spent therein the committee rose and reported that they had had under consideration

H. F. No. 2, A bill for an act to amend section two, chapter fortyfour, of the special laws of one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, entitled an act to amend chapter twenty-four of the special laws of one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, entitled an act to authorize the towns of Fillmore, Mower, Freeborn, Faribault, Martin and Jackson counties to issue bonds to aid in the construction of any railroads running into or through said counties,

And report the same back, and recommend its passage.

On motion of Mr. Barton, the report of the committee was adopted. Leave of absence was granted to Mr. Vance.

On motion of Mr. Rice, the House adjourned.
