In the year 2000 we started looking at using a process called" Enhanced Use Lease" that the VA has nation-wide for their properties. We wanted to build 218 units of permanent housing on the VA Campus in Minneapolis and 120 units of transitional and permanent housing on the St. Cloud VA Campus. We would use VA land for these projects.

We had the support of Greater Metropolitan Housing Corporation who suggested we work with Community Housing Development Corporation and their teams for this project. We did that. We were able to secure through legislation \$462,000.000 to MHFA in 2001 to be used for development of this project. It is viewed as one project in two locations. The name of this project is "Veterans and Community Housing Initiative". In the bonding year of 2002 we were able to secure \$16.2 million dollars for this project, money directed to MHFA for this use. This project is designed for veterans and non-veteran single adults, permanent, sober housing. Construction is scheduled to start by the summer of 2004. Today the number of housing units for Minneapolis is a 140 and 60 unit for St. Cloud.

<u>Grant & Per Diem:</u> On track financially. This is the grant that covers the beds in Building 47. Our first year review will be next April. Activity highlights include a fishing trip October 8th and 9th at Fishers Resort at Mille Lacs done in conjunction with the Vet Center. Talso have started a monthly 'cooking' afternoon at 47. Sometimes we make cookies or brownies. In November, we made apple crisp. VFW Post 5555 also made a cash donation that paid for a Thanksgiving Feast held at Building 47 and any residents of the SIL houses that didn't have family plans were invited to attend.

HVRP (Homeless Veterans Re-integration Program Grant): We have completed the first quarter of our 2nd year of funding with this grant and also completed a 90-day follow-up of the previous year's funding. We attempted to contact all veterans served by this grant for the first funding year, which ended June 30, 2004. Those who participated in the phone interview received a bus pass or gas card (\$10 value). Approximately 20 veterans were interviewed (also representing about 20% of those served). Of that number, 5 now own a home. For this quarter report, the case managers submitted bios of some of the veterans this grant is serving. I have these as a handout for your review. A weekly job club held at the VA open to MACV and VA IT/CWT clients has been a huge success. The Job Club is a supportive and educational intervention program in collaboration with the VA Hospital Work Therapy Program. Veterans are required to participate with the support of the case manager at MACV and also the Veterans Administration Hospital. The MACV Job Club coordinators have had speakers come on a regular basis to talk to the clients about various barriers to employment. 8 of our clients were just hired as permanent PT employees at the VA. We continue to coordinate and outreach on location at Alliance Apartments, Dorothy Day Center, and Union Gospel Mission. We have also had meetings with our counterparts at Turning Point and the Minneapolis Veterans Home. We also work closely with Voc Rehab and the Workforce Center. We also had a four-hour Ethics Training course for all staff. Two of the HVRP case managers attended a great course for two-days titled "The Four Cornerstones of Financial Literacy: Training for Coaches and Caseworkers taught by St. John's University.

<u>MN Dept. of VA State Grant</u>: This grant is on track financially. During this time frame, 128 veterans were served. We also survey all clients who receive services under this grant. Attached are bios of a few of these 128 veterans.

<u>SIL Housing (Structured Independent Living)</u>: We have 26 transitional beds in these 9 houses (one in St. Cloud). Clients can stay in this housing for up to two years as they stabilize their employment and savings accounts. We charge a program fee of \$330/month per veteran that includes housing and all utilities paid. Veterans in this housing must comply with a set of rules and guidelines including attendance of two 12-step meetings every week and participating in a variety of MACV functions. The houses have just had all the furnaces checked for winter and the client housing committee has been meeting and painting the interior of the houses made possible by a paint donation from Valspar.

<u>Vetlaw:</u> The MACV VETLAW program has begun a review/evaluation process conducted by a consultant acquired through our MAP relationship. The final report regarding this review should be available by Fcb 1, 2005. MACV staff have been interviewed and 7 of our clients are scheduled for individual interviews this week.

Kathleen Vitalis Chief Operating Officer

Curtis W.

<u>Subject</u>: Curtis is a 44-year-old African American male Marine Corp veteran who was referred to MACV by a recovery friend familiar with MACV. He was in imminent danger of becoming homeless and was unemployed.

Observation/Assessment: When Curtis was first screened he appeared ready to present to potential employers. He was well groomed and possessed proper attire, articulate and highly motivated, but needed guidance with his job search, resume building and housing. It was assessed that Curtis was in need of a structured job-seeking plan, development of a resume and rental assistance to remove the obstacle of potential homelessness. **Plan:** Curtis was enrolled in the MnDVA on 10-07-04. He was given rental assistance, clothing voucher, enrolled in the Living Skills Program to include Looking for Work, Managing Money to provide basic skills for getting and maintaining employment, He

participated in the Job Club where he was given employment referrals, provided case management, created a structured job search schedule, and applied for a minimum of 10 new jobs per week. Curtis secured employment thru a temporary service; he was later hired on at Trendex as a full-time employee making \$10.00 per hour.

Craig L.

<u>Subject</u>: Craig is a 51-year-old, male, Caucasian, Army Veteran, who was self-referral following completion of a residential drug/alcohol program at St. Cloud V.A. He is currently employed but in imminent danger of becoming homeless unless he secures housing, he had been living with his daughter but is unable to continue to reside with her. <u>Observation/Assessment</u>: Craig appeared highly motivated to continue his program of sobriety, that if he could find a structured transitional housing program, supportive of his recovery program he be able to maintain his employment and work on his recovery issues.

Plan: He was screened and found appropriate and placed in a Structured Independent Living house thus creating a supportive, sober living environment and allowing him to maintain his employment, He will have weekly session with his case manager, required to attend 12-step meetings and weekly contact with his recovery sponsor. He was referred to Vet Law to deal with past legal issues that are potential barriers to both promotions at his present employer and competitive employment at other companies.

Roilandes R

<u>Subject</u>: Roilandes is a 23-year-old African American female Navy veteran who was referred to MACV by the Hennepin County CVSO. The veteran was homeless and living with family with her two children aged four and two. Roilandes was unemployed when first interviewed by MACV.

Observation/Assessment: When the veteran first interviewed she was highly emotional and feeling hopeless and desperate. The veteran seemed motivated towards finding employment yet appeared to at a loss of how to go about it. Roilandes reports that she has not had problems with drugs or alcohol. The veteran was assessed and it was determined that she was in need of assistance with housing and the development of a structured job seeking plan. She was enrolled into MACV on 10/13/2004.

Plan: Roilandes located housing and was provided thirty days by MACV. She was also enrolled in the MACV job club. The veterans housing was condemned by the county, and she moved back in with family. Through his involvement in MACV, the veteran has engaged in an active job hunt. After observing her motivation, Roilandes was enrolled by MACV into InFlight Career Services, Inc. flight attendant training program. She graduated and has been invited to attend a job fair for top graduates. She continues to work with MACV and InFlight representatives to find employment in the aviation field, and has high hopes of being employed by the end of January, 2005.

Darren F.

<u>Subject</u>: Darren is a 49 year old, single, Caucasian male, Army veteran who was homeless and participating in a VAMC Psychiatric program when he was referred to MACV by Health Care for Homeless Veterans at the VAMC.

Observation/Assessment: Darren was screened and found appropriate and placed into Bldg. 47. The veteran appeared motivated towards making positive changes when he entered, but had a long history of alcohol relapse which had cost him his job as a mail carrier after 17 years. While in Bldg. 47 he accessed the DAV for clothing, CVSO for dental/optical, received bus cards and basic hygiene items. He attended programming at the VAMC, Minneapolis, for his mental and physical health issues and he became an active participant in MACV programming which includes Living Skills, Recovery Dynamics, Computer Lab, and working with the Job Developer constructing his resume and learning basic job hunting and interviewing skills. Darren worked diligently to increase his employability by developing a sober lifestyle.

Plan: Darren completed the IWT portion of Veterans Industries and was screened by Veterans Industries and accepted placement into the full time CWT program. Since entering this CWT, Darren has accessed and been accepted at a local Junior College where he will complete the required academics for licensure as a Certified Nursing Assistant. The veterans' training is being funded through the HVRP grant. He has transitioned into a SIL residence and has gotten a strong start on removing the barriers that contributed to his homelessness and taking strides towards his goal of finding full time employment in health care.

Jeffrey G

<u>Subject</u>: Jeff is a 42-year-old Caucasian male USMC veteran who was referred by CVSO Hennepin County. Jeff was in the Imminent Risk of being homeless because his two years at the Heilman House Transitional Program was completed and unemployed when initially screened by MACV.

Observation/Assessment: When the veteran was first interviewed he seemed motivated and eager to find employment. Jeff has completed a treatment program and has been sober for more than three years, the veteran also stated no longer have a drinking or drugs problem. The veteran was assessed and it was determined that Jeff was in deed of assistance with rental assistant, transportation, resume writing, and the development of a structured job seeking plan. Jeff was enrolled into HVRP on October 21, 2004. <u>Plan</u>: The veteran was provided rental assistant, bus pass, Food Voucher and a DAV clothing voucher were also provided to Jeff to assist in his active job search. The veteran participated in Job Club where he was given employment referrals, provided case management, created a structured job search, and applied for a minimum of 10 jobs per week. Jeff has obtained employment at Clarion Hotel making 10.00 per hour.

Michael R.

<u>Subject</u>: Michael is a 49-year-old African American male Army veteran who was referred by CVSO Hennepin County. Michael was in the Imminent Risk of being evicted from his apartment and who would have been homeless and unemployed when initially screened by MACV.

Observation/Assessment: When the veteran was first interviewed he seemed motivated and eager to find employment. Michael reported that he had no problem with drugs or alcohol. The veteran was assessed and it was determined that Michael was in need of assistance with rental assistant, resume writing, and the development of a structured job seeking plan. Michael was enrolled into HVRP on October 1, 2004.

<u>Plan</u>: The veteran was provided help with rental assistant and assisted with an active job search. Michael participated in Job Club where he was given employment referrals, provided case management, created a structured job search and development of a structured job seeking plan. Michael has obtained employment at Robbinsdale School District earning \$11.13 per hours.

Michael G.

<u>Subject</u>: Michael J. Gates is a 44 year old divorced Caucasian male Navy Veteran. Michael was self referred he had already been a previous client so he was familiar with the services MACV had to offer to veterans.

Observation/Assessment: Michael had received living skills, computer lab, and Job Club. Michael was assessed in being ready to go seek job employment. It was found that he was in need of structured and stable housing, and assistance with food to support himself until he could obtain permanent employment.

<u>Plan</u>: On December 17, 2004 an intake was done on Michael Gates he was found appropriate and placed in one of the SIL houses Michael was placed on HCHV which covered his program fee=s for the month, and provided him with \$240 in Cub food vouchers. By 12/20/04 Michael had been hired, working for Great Lakes Management Co. making \$18 dollars an hour.

Glen W.

<u>Subject</u>: Glen is a 48 year old single Caucasian Army veteran. He was referred to MACV from Carrie Fletcher at the Addicted Disorder Clinic. At the time of Glenn's arrival he was staying with a relative who was moving somewhere to receive home health care. Glen was unemployed receiving unemployment and the payments were just about exhausted. <u>Observation/Assessment</u>: When the veteran was first observed, he did not appear ready to present himself to potential employers .It was determine from doing the assessment that Glen was in need of housing, transportation assistance, food, and to brush up on his

writing and resume skills to get prepared for job searching. Glen also discussed issues of not filing taxes since 1996.

Plan: On 8-31-04 an intake was done on Glen Ward, and he was found appropriate and placed in our Structured Independent Living house where he received case management skills. Glen was also placed in our job development program. In this program he received assistance with writing resumes= and placing them at the job bank. Glenn also received interviewing techniques. A bus pass was given to him to pursue active job search. Glenn was also referred to our VETLAW program to help him obtain his credit report and start addressing his taxes. Glenn was also placed on HCHV which provided him with food vouchers as well. Today Glenn is gainfully employed with two jobs, Viking Security making \$12.96 an hour, and for the University Of Minnesota as a police dispatcher making \$18.00 an hour.

MNDVA VON Report Fall Quarter 2004

Fall ended with a flourish of actives for the VON office and staff. October found us working on many reports two HUD APR's, CDBG/ESG, Northland



Foundation and others. Early November we prepared for and completed National Hunger and Homeless Week with the example of the "Homeless Veterans Home" made up of 4,300 red, white and blue flags at Bayfront in Duluth. There was great PR in the media and to date we raised over \$5,243.00 (final numbers are not in as yet.) At the same time we saw the fall rush for housing begin and some very special issues we had to address (see below). Memorial Apartments is moving forward (Ed Culbert

and I will presented at board meeting) with a local steering community formed chaired by Ed Culbert. We have met and may need to meet again after the holidays.

Our year had good results and looking forward to the challenges of a new year. One of our Clients enjoyed Christmas for the first time in nine years with his family. The Duluth Business University (DBU) medical students completed their fall semester with MACV as their chosen charity and we honored DBU for their assistance. We continued a project now with growing season completed with the Kiwanis, Rotary Club's, and NERC (County work farm) to volunteer our clients to deliver farm produce to local food shelves, and soup kitchens. This gives our clients a "hands-on" way to give back to the community as well as making a difference in the lives of other. We have delivered over 9,000 pounds of food to date since we started. Our veterans volunteered for the "Ghosts Ship" that collects can foods for the Salvation Army and our guys help by picking it up and deliver it. They like doing this as they get to tour the ship for free. Six beds were provided to Veterans and their families thru the Slumberland's "Home for the Holidays Program" and NVVA provided all the bedding needed for those veterans. Our HCHV veterans helped load mattresses and bedsprings then delivered them to the families. We are still receiving more donations from the NHHW project of November. Our veterans helped out at the Salvation Army annual Christmas project for needy families. The Christmas Open House was well attended and plans are already underway for next year to be at the DEPOT in downtown Duluth.

I am currently serving on two local taskforces. The "Heating Group" will have input in what resources that are available for the community. This helps us have access to other community resources and in turn provide services to those who in the community that may not be aware of MACV. I have also been asked to serve on the Mayor's "Taskforce to End Homelessness in Duluth." We are to develop a ten-year plan for ending homelessness. This is important that we are at the table in both cases to be a resource and to be sure that the needs of those we serve are included.

Our staff has completed three computer classes (Access, Outlook, & Excel) at Lake Superior Community College business outreach program funded by grants from NCHV and City of Duluth Senior Aids program. This will help to put us all on better footing for the work we need to do. Sam's Club and a private donation have replaced my computer and we replaced Cliffs with a donation from Wal-Mart with the assistance of Northland Vietnam Veterans Association.

I believe that you need to know some of the good work that our staff is doing so I have asked Harriet and Cliff to contribute to this report.

NE CoC (Harriet Harrington) Notes & Case Studies

MACV received special permission from HUD to add a seventh family to our Transitional Housing Program for a limited time. The family of five lost their home due to fire. The veteran is disabled and his wife is his primary care giver. Everything in the home was destroyed and the building is completely gone. We provided the family with rental assistance, and will continue while there is still need. Coordination of services with The Salvation Army, Carlton County CVSO, and local VSO's has assisted the family during this transition.

A veteran and her 9-year-old daughter are part of the MACV Transitional housing in Northeastern Minnesota. The mother and daughter became homeless when the grandmother they were living with lost her home due to bank repossession. The mother had a large medical debt and a limited income to cover these debts. These medical bills will be paid in full by the end of November. The daughter is now covered by her father's medical insurance, so that future debt will not occur. The veteran has since entered Fond du Lac Community college and is majoring in law enforcement. She is maintaining A's and B's. The daughter's grades in school are up from last year. The family is stable and progressing towards a healthy future.

A couple in our program was losing their housing due to the sale of the house by the landlord with little notice. We assisted the family in finding new housing. Damage deposit and rental assistance are being provided. If not for this program, the couple would have been forced into homelessness again.

Our staff was able to assist a family whose home was destroyed by fire with two months with rent thru the North East Continuum of Care funding of our Transitional Housing Program. Family exited program in December after receiving Insurance money to purchase new home.

In March of 2004, a VA Social Worker referred a 55-year-old Vietnam Veteran to program. He was living in a shelter on \$210 VA Disability. We assisted him in filing for Social Security and increased VA Disability. He was trying to

obtain custody of his two teenage children who were living with their mother and her boyfriend in an abusive and hostile home. He could not obtain custody without a proper home for his children. This veteran found housing and even negotiated with the landlord to lower the rent by over one hundred dollars. MACV'S Transitional Housing Program provided rental payments. In December he received word that his Social Security was approved and received a small partial payment, with his back pay coming within 30 days. The VA increased his disability to 30%. His County Veteran Service Officer is filing for a full disability. The best news is that he has been awarded full custody of his children

HCHV (Cliff Gawne-Mark) Notes & Case Studies

During November the clients provided many hours of volunteer work. Vegetables from the North East Regional Corrections Center (NERC) were delivered to the Salvation Army, Union Gospel Mission, and the Damiano Center. Several mailings were completed with the volunteer help of the clients. As the veterans participate in these, and other, volunteer activities, they are able to experience to gift of altruistic actions that benefit others. This helps the veteran develop a sense of community as they re-integrate into society.

We at the VON office wish all the members of the Board a very blessed holiday season and a wonderful new year. MACV will be having many challenges in this New Year and we are prepared to help Jimmie, Kathy, and the board to achieve what is in front of us on behalf of those we serve.

This veteran had been in a successful recovery program and has been a very active member in AA. He had no income, nor a place to live. He was referred by the CHUM Center where he had been staying for a couple of nights. This veteran has family in the area. Minnesota residency and veterans status was verified and he started the HCHV program and was housed at the YWCA. He was a very active participant in the Living Skills class and started his job search during his first week of enrollment, and volunteered at VON whenever there was an opportunity. Since he had a valid drivers license with a commercial rating, he targeted several of the trucking companies as potential employers. As he continued his employment exploration, he celebrated nine years of continuous recovery. He obtained a job driving over the road. This required long hours and working conditions that, because of his age, made it difficult for him. Still employed, he continued his job search. After obtaining a new position, he quit his one position and is employed on a local driving route. He has been faithful paying his participation fees and is clearing up past debts. This veteran has re-established meaningful contact and reconciliation with his family. He will be transitioning out of the HCHV program in November. He attends AA three times per week and attends the Living Skills classes when his work schedule permits. He said that he continues to attend the classes because it is, "My way of giving back what he has received from others."

A 55-year-old veteran who served in the Air Calvary in Vietnam since his discharge he has traveled around the United States, staying in various cities for a couple of years before, once again, moving on. He has worked at numerous jobs including working on oil platforms in the Gulf of Mexico off of the Louisiana coast, shrimp fishing in Alaska, fishing boats out of Washington, and various day labor jobs. He is an accomplished drywall installer.

CHUM referred this veteran to MACV from their shelter. After residency and veterans status was verified he entered the HCHV program and was provided a room at the YWCA. He has been a very active participant in the Living Skills classes and has followed all staff recommendations.

As a result of his participation in the HCHV program he has begun to get stability in his life. He has applied for a service-connected disability for PTSD, for which he had been diagnosed several years ago, and for Hep-C. He received a wonderful Christmas present when he was informed that he would be beginning a CWT position at Twin Ports Outpatient Clinic.

He continues daily participation in the classes and is a ready volunteer whenever there is a need. He provides emotional support to others in the HCHV program and is beginning to put down roots in the community. Without the services provided MACV through the VON office, the stability and growth that this veteran is experiencing would not have been possible.

Some of the providers included Social Security Administration, Public Health, Minnesota Valley Action Council, Blue Earth County Human Services, Senator Coleman's staff, Senator Dayton's staff, Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs, Minneapolis VA Hospital, VA HepC Clinic, MN Veterans Home, MN Family Assistance Center, VA Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor, St. Paul Vet Center, U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, Volunteer Attorneys, State of MN Veterans Employment Representatives, Vietnam Veterans of America, several County VSO's, Salvation Army, and many others. We will make this an annual event for our Southern Minnesota Veterans.

The VOS Supportive Housing Project continues to go well. We received the deed for the 1.6 acres of land that was donated by W. C. Radichel. We have secured \$724,500 from HUD, \$464,566 from MHFA and \$100,000 from Blue Earth County. We are now in the process of completing all documentation that is required with this funding. A June 1 2005 construction date is planned. This will provide 11- 1-bedroom units of supportive housing for disabled veterans that are homeless.

This quarter we enrolled 10 veterans in our HCHV program. We were able to provide a total of 920 bed days to these veterans. Supportive services including case management, food, and referrals to outside resources are a part of this program. Referrals to our program come from County Veteran Service Officers, Salvation Army, Social Service Agencies, family members, and fellow veterans.

Minnesota's homeless veterans have more mental illness and substance abuse than other homeless men, but more have jobs

Dec. 9, 2004, St. Paul. Military veterans are no more likely than other men their age to be homeless, but they have much higher rates of mental illness and chemical dependency than other homeless men their age.

Despite that fact, and despite the recent recession, homeless veterans have higher employment rates than other homeless men their age, according to a new report from Wilder Research.

More than one-third of homeless veterans are employed and 20 percent work full-time, which is similar to the situation in 2000. In contrast, other homeless adults lost ground on employment during the early 2000s, dropping from 41 percent to 30 percent employed, and from 26 percent to 13 percent working full-time.

Iow many homeless veterans?

Homeless military veterans in Minnesota include about 650 men and 50 women on any given night. They make up about one-quarter of the homeless men and 2 percent of the homeless women in the state. The Wilder special report covers both male and female veterans. It is based on results of the 2003 statewide survey of homelessness, conducted every three years since 1991.

The new report also finds that homeless male veterans are more likely than other homeless men their age to have grown up in Minnesota, been married at some point, have more education, be White, and be better able to find and keep a job even while homeless.

"This leads us to question whether something about the military service background of these men has contributed to their homelessness," said Greg Owen, the Wilder Research scientist who led the statewide survey.

"When we look at homeless veterans, they do not fit as closely into the common themes that we see so frequently among other homeless adults – having a very rough start in life, spending time in foster care or some other placement as children, and entering adulthood without much stability or preparation to come self-sufficient," said Owen. "The homeless veterans simply do not fit that profile as strongly as her homeless men."

More mental and chemical problems, and more treatment

The Wilder report finds that nearly half of homeless male veterans (47%) have serious mental illness (primarily depression and post-traumatic stress disorder), much higher than in the age-matched comparison group of homeless men who did not serve in the military (33%).

Similarly, 54 percent of homeless veterans have alcoholism or other chemical dependency problems, compared to 38 percent of the other homeless men.

However, many homeless veterans received treatment for their chemical dependency problems in the past two years: 74 percent of homeless veterans with chemical problems received inpatient or outpatient treatment in the past two years, compared to only 61 percent of other homeless men of their age.

More veterans also received mental health treatment: 69 percent of veterans with mental health problems got help in the past two years, compared to only 62 percent of other homeless men their age with mental health problems.

Veterans with combat experience

About one-third of the homeless veterans in Minnesota served in a combat zone: 24 percent in Vietnam, 6 percent in the first Gulf War, 1 percent each in Korea and Lebanon, and 2 percent on other conflicts, including two men from the current war in Iraq.

The Wilder study finds that these combat veterans were even more likely to have serious mental illness than homeless veterans who did not have combat experience (55 percent of combat veterans compared to 46 percent of other veterans).

Another difference was that more of the combat veterans (63%) had been married at some point, compared to other homeless veterans (52%).

"There is a lot we can learn from homeless veterans, and especially combat veterans, about the difficulties our next wave of veterans might face and the kinds of support they will need," said Owen.

More facts about homeless veterans

Most of Minnesota's homeless veterans (60%) served in the military for more than two years, and 76 percent received an honorable discharge. Vietnam-era veterans are the largest group (41%), including both men and women. The average age of homeless veterans is 48, about six years older than the average for homeless men in Minnesota.

On a single night in October 2003, Wilder Research found:

- 702 homeless military veterans in Minnesota
- 652 men and 50 women
- 88 on the streets and in other unsheltered locations
- 423 in the Twin Cities area and 191 in greater Minnesota
- 117 children accompanying homeless veterans

The percentage of homeless veterans who ...

- Are employed: 36%
- Are working full-time: 20%
- If working, earn less than \$10 per hour: 67%
- Have income of \$300 or less for the past month: 43%
- Have chronic medical problems: 50%

- They must be homeless, and their homeless status must be verified by a shelter, transitional housing, jail, etc. They will also sign a homeless verification form.

n a quiet street in Minneapolis sits a quaint stucco cottage. With its hardwood

floors, arched doorways and cozy fireplace, it's a house most people would be proud to call home. In the kitchen window sit plump tomatoes freshly picked from the lush plants growing in the yard.

An unsightly tree stump out back has been painted to look like the U.S. flag, and the pansies are in bloom. Vince Hallas, a previous resident, can be thanked for these artistic endeavors.

But after all his hard work, he had to leave. Hallas, 43, wasn't prepared to live alone. Not yet anyway. He was living in the cottage as a guest of Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans (MACV).

A former Marine, Hallas was sober, but knew that to continue healing, he would need to go back to MACV's Building 47 on the campus of the Minneapolis Veterans Affairs Medical Center. It's a place, Hallas says, he can get the support he needs to stay on track.

Since its inception more than 12 years ago, MACV has assisted 2,600 homeless veterans, or about the equivalent of five battalions, as the program's president and CEO, Jimmie L. Coulthard, likes to say.

And for veterans like Hallas, it has become known as a haven for homeless vets. A Marine from 1979-1982, including a year at U.S. Naval Air Station Keflavic, Iceland, where he was a helicopter door gunner, Hallas says he had non-combatrelated psychological problems, which he later tried to bury with alcohol.

After being honorably discharged from the Marines, he went from one job to the next. Undergoing bouts of homelessness, Hallas wound up at MACV a little over a year ago.

He is preparing to move to a state veterans home in Hastings for further rehabilitation.

Hallas' story is like many others who have come through MACV's program, according to Coulthard, who can personally relate to these veterans.

After serving with C Co., 3rd Bn., 196th Light Inf. Bde., in Vietnam in 1967-68, Coulthard found it nearly impossible to reintegrate into society after the war. He was drinking all the time, but admits he was a heavy drinker before he went to war.

Coulthard became a riverboat captain, pushing barges down the Mississippi, Ohio and Illinois rivers. It was a job, he says, that saved his life.

"We worked 30 days on and 30 days off with six-hour shifts," says Coulthard, now 59 and celebrating 20 years of sobriety this month. "It exhausted me, and I just needed to sleep."

He came off the river in 1986 to become a substance abuse counselor at a halfway house. Six years later, with

"nothing but a yellow legal pad," Coulthard was hired by a committee to develop a statewide homeless veterans program initiated by a VFW member.

VFW Gets the Ball Rolling

When WWII veteran Geri Wedel heard about a homeless veteran freezing to death on the streets of Minneapolis, she was incensed. The tragedy spurred her to action. Having served as an Army nurse in the Philippines, Wedel asked her VFW Post to provide her with \$500 to get 501(c)(3) status to start a homeless veterans organization.

Post 6845 in St. Paul put up the cash, and the program became a non-profit corporation. Coulthard said Post member John O'Neill, who also served as Department adjutant for 18 years, even paid for some of the start-up costs out of his own pocket.

MACV secured a home where Coulthard lived for a period with the program's homeless. He describes it as a "hectic" time.

In July 1993, MACV secured a Homeless Chronically Mentally Ill contract from the Health Care for Homeless Veterans Program at the Minneapolis VA Medical Center. It was able to convert a building on the sprawling VA campus into a 13-bed facility—it's fondly known among the homeless as "Building 47."

For \$1 per year, MACV leases the facility, which was once a day nursery for children with family members in the hospital. (The nursery was the project of 1962 VFW Department Commander Al Loehr and Ladies Auxiliary Department President Lola Reid. They remain active supporters of MACV.)

Coulthard notes that what was once a gift from VFW and veterans has now been returned to the veterans.

"It's nice to see that this building has really come full circle," he says.

The program has grown tremendously since its beginning. Today, there are eight transitional homes in Minneapolis and one in St. Cloud.

Offices in Duluth (Veterans Outreach North) and Mankato (Veterans Outreach South) also assist veterans. In Mankato, 11 units for disabled veterans are being built. Furthermore, an impressive \$16 million expansion project (paid for by general obligation bonds) will add 140 permanent supportive housing units on the Minneapolis VAMC grounds and 60 units in St. Cloud. It will be a "veterans gift to the community" since half the beds will be filled by non-veterans. But it will never be occupied by less than 51% veterans, according to Coulthard.

Widespread Support

Noting that about 85% of MACV's funding comes from federal and state grants, Coulthard said that without the supporting entities, none of this would be possible. The U.S. Department of Labor, the National Coalition for Home-less Veterans, Department of Housing and Urban Development, and the Minnesota VA are just a few.

Prior to his death, Sen. Paul Wellstone (D-Minn.) secured a \$500,000 Depart-

ment of Labor grant for MACV's VET-LAW program. It provides free legal aid to homeless veterans.

VA's Grant and Per Diem Program provides funding for Building 47, including the employment of Nathaniel Saltz, 32, who serves as case manager for the residents there. Saltz, whose background is in education, was trained in alcohol and drug counseling because his job is to urge vets to fend for themselves.

"Having the blessing of VA partners and the state is extremely important for us to function," Coulthard says. "And county veterans service officers are our front line of defense."

He further notes that Linda Boone, with the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans, has been instrumental in MACV's progress.

And then there are the veterans service organizations whose members support the homeless program. George Udeth and Millie Johnson of VFW Post 5555 in Richfield and its Auxiliary deliver food weekly to Building 47. Furthermore, the Post sponsors an annual cookout for the residents. Members like Chuck Lindbergh—the only remaining survivor of the first flag raising on Iwo Jima—visit homeless vets and know them by name.

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"We're proud to be doing this," Millie says. "And it makes us very happy."

The founding Post is still an avid supporter. VFW Post 6583's Auxiliary faithfully donates \$100 a month to MACV.

According to Rick Peterson, who has worked for MACV since early on, the Minnesota National Guard is a huge supporter, as well. He works with the Guard on maintenance projects, such as roofing and painting, at the transitional homes.

"It's pretty amazing to see what they [Guard members] can get done in a day," he says.

Providing a 'Structured Environment'

Veterans at MACV are provided with weekly computer training and are required to participate in VA's compensated work therapy program (CWT). They receive support in recovering from addictions and mental illnesses.

Coulthard says veterans are required to follow a 12-step program by attending at least two Alcoholics Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous meetings a week.

"For those who claim not to be chemically dependent, they must attend Al-Anon meetings because they are living among addicts and alcoholics," he says. Army vet Douglas Allen, 49, lost his home in April and wound up at Building 47 in June. He is working in the kitchen at the hospital as part of CWT.

"I have four years of sobriety and start every day new," he says. "These people believe in me and are helping me to believe in myself.

Allen, who was in the Army from 1980-1984, spent a good deal of his life drinking. He had two heart attacks, making work more difficult.

"I don't know where I'd be if it weren't for this place," says Allen, who was stationed in Germany as a light wheel vehicle driver.

Like one-third of the veterans who come to MACV, Allen is really working hard. Coulthard says another third will succeed after several setbacks, and the remaining third won't make it all.

"We help these guys by providing a structured environment," he says. "Some of them have been living outside for so long, they've forgotten basic social skills."

Take Leroy Namen, for example. He figured if Daniel Boone could do it, so could he. So for two years he lived on the banks of the Mississippi River, drinking his life away. Somehow he survived two of Minnesota's notoriously frigid winters.

Namen, a Navy vet who served from 1979-1983 and was stationed on Diego Garcia as a boiler repairman, was down on his luck and turned to the bottle for solace. It wasn't the life he wanted, and he knew he needed to change.

"One night I began praying for help, and the next day this guy came walking out of the woods," says Namen, 45. "I thought he just wanted my booze. But it was Bill Johnson, who took me in and got me help. I made a promise to myself that day that I would give it 100% and I have."

Today, Namen is a pipefitter at the VA hospital.

"I have my life back and I feel like I'm somebody," he says. "I'd be six feet under ground if it weren't for these guys."

Coulthard says Johnson, who works for VA's Homeless Veterans Outreach program, has helped his fair share of vets over the years. He knows who's who in the homeless shelters and soup kitchens and has earned the trust of veterans still living on the streets.

Namen isn't the only vet to credit MACV for saving his life. Herman White,

53, a current participant in the program, concurs. Pulling security guard duty at an ammo dump in Qui Nhon, Vietnam (1971-1972), White was a heavy drug user after the war and realized he was killing himself.

He says the MACV staff showed him there was a better life to live, one that could involve his 13-year-old son.

"I always wanted to be able to tell my son not to use, but couldn't because I was using," White says. "Now I can help him understand why it's bad to use drugs."

White is currently living in a state veterans home in Minneapolis while he continues the recovery process.

Some veterans who arrive at Building 47, like Randy Dyck, do a little research and make the journey alone. Dyck, 55, who says he's been an alcoholic since he had his first drink at age 7, was living out of his car with only a few possessions. He went to the library and found MACV on the Internet.

He stayed in the program for six months and went to work at the VA hospital. Today, he is a published novelist (*Bitten* was published in April 2004 by Publish America, Frederick, Md.), and a staff support secretary with VA.

A veteran of the Vietnam War with the 4th Infantry Division from 1968-1969, Dyck went through the entire program with a "renewed vigor for life." He even has his own Web site, *www.randalldyck.com*, which has excerpts from his novels and a link to MACV.

Peter Riggs is another shining example of how MACV helps turn lives around. Substance abuse problems landed Riggs in a homeless shelter.

"One night I just looked around and wondered what I was doing there," says Riggs, 50, who spent 11 years in the Army, including a year in Germany where he was a Patriot missileman. "I knew I had too much going for myself to keep living under those conditions."

Riggs finished the program and went on to receive his master's degree in public policy. He is currently working toward his second degree, works in VA's urgent care department and serves on MACV's board of directors.

He hopes to venture into the fundraising arena since he is convinced there are big corporations out there looking for a worthy cause to fund.

MACV Admission Requirements

- DD-214 or discharge documentation from a VA regional office must verify veteran status. No vets with bad conduct, undesirable or dishonorable discharges are allowed.
- Must be homeless, and that status must be confirmed by a homeless shelter, transitional housing unit, jail or eviction notice. Veteran must sign a homeless certification form.
- A picture ID must be presented or obtained from the VA or state.
- Proof of income, if currently working.
- Some housing arrangements require proof of 60 days of sobriety.

MACV is Like Making 'Stone Soup'

With the expansion under way, Coulthard, who also is the VFW Department chairman for the Homeless Veterans Committee, is looking ahead to bigger plans. It's his dream to one day have a complex for the homeless who are located in outlying rural areas. He hopes someone will donate land, or perhaps even a farm.

He also wishes VFW Posts throughout the state will offer to sponsor the transitional houses by paying the mortgages.

Coulthard likens MACV to the stone soup fable, where villagers aren't willing to individually help three tired soldiers, but pull together in the end.

For getting people to work together, Jimmy Collier is a good one to have around. He gave up a good job with Blue Cross Blue Shield to work for veterans. Collier is someone Coulthard refers to as a real "ball of fire."

A 22-year veteran of the Army, Collier, 50, is an employment specialist, working with companies like Comcast and Global Aviation to place veterans in jobs. So far this year, he has gotten 55 vets hired.

"There's nothing finer than this place," says Collier, whose military du stations included Belgium, Germany and Korea. "It's the second best job to being in the Army."

With an estimated 3,400 homeless vets living in Minnesota (according to an October 2000 Wilder Survey), Coulthard is glad to have men like Collier at his side. Though the survey also said 42% of the state's homeless vets served from 1964-1975, most of the vets currently at MACV *are not* Vietnam veterans, as is the popular misconception.

Furthermore, a 1996 study by VA doctor Robert Rosenheck states: "Homelessness among veterans is not clearly related to combat military experience. Homeless veterans appear less likely to have served in combat than housed [those who have never been homeless] veterans."

"We've had men from all wars com through here, but a lot of them have never been to war," Coulthard says. "They have all served our country, though."

Coulthard adds that no one is ever turned away. Even if someone doesn't meet the requirements (see screened box at upper left) or all the beds are full, Coulthard and his staff will find a bed for the veteran. "We also can contact the VA here and get proof of eligibility," he says. Although MACV no longer accepts homeless women vets, which make up less than 2% of the homeless vet population, the staff does refer them to shelters such as St. Stephens or Simpsons in Minneapolis.

A happily married man and grandfather of seven, Coulthard says he will continue his mission until MACV is well-secured and funded.

"I think I have been able to turn m dark past into something good, and that makes me happy," he says. "I've just learned not to take the disappointments personally."

Article 1 License Plates

Section 1. [Special "Support our Troops" License Plates.] General requirements and procedures.

Subdivision 1. [General Requirements.] authorizes the special plate with language similar to that of the state's Critical Habitat license plate, except that this plate would be available for motorcycles, in addition to passenger autos, pickups, and recreational vehicles (RVs). The \$30 annual contribution would be the minimum amount for eligibility.

Subdivision 2. [Design.] authorizes the Adjutant General and Commissioner of Veterans Affairs to design the new plate.

Subdivision 3. [No Refund.] stipulates that contributions are nonrefundable.

Subdivision 4. [Plate Transfers.] provides that for a fee of \$5, the new special plate may be transferred to another passenger auto, pickup, RV, or motorcycle owned by the person.

Subdivision 5.[Contribution and Fees Credited.] directs that contributions be credited to the "Support our Troops" account.

Subdivision 6. [Record.] directs the commissioner to keep a record of the number of plates issued.
Section 2. ["Support Our Troops" Account.]

Subdivision 1. [Establishment.] establishes this account in the state treasury.

Subdivision 2. [Grants.] appropriates money in the account to the adjutant general for grants to alleviate financial hardships faced by members of the Minnesota National Guard and other military reserve units based in Minnesota, or for Guard and reserve members who are Minnesota residents based outside the state, if they have been ordered into certain types of "active duty." Certain immediate family members of these persons may also be eligible. The adjutant general may make grants to individuals or to certain 501(c)(3) foundations. The maximum grant to an eligible individual in a year is \$2,000.

Subdivision 3. [Annual Report.] requires the adjutant general to annually report on the number, amounts, and the use of grants awarded in the previous year.

Article 2 National Guard Funding

Section 1. [Appropriation.] This section appropriates from the general fund to the Adjutant General for the 2006-2007 biennium:

- \$3.85 million each year, for the National Guard's tuition reimbursement program; and
- \$1.5 million each year, for the National Guard's reenlistment bonus program.

Article 3 Bonding

Section 1. [Appropriation.] provides appropriations of:

- \$670,000 to the Commissioner of Administration for construction of a WWII veterans memorial on the Capitol Mall; and
- \$6,306,000 to the Veterans Home Board as follows:
- 1. \$6,000,000 for asset maintenance and improvements at the homes; and
- 2. \$306,000 for the dementia unit at the Luverne Veterans Home.

Section 2. [Bond Sale.] authorizes the sale of state bonds in the amount of \$6,976,000.

Article 4 Income Tax

Section 1. [**Resident; Definition.**] expands the definition of nonresident for income tax purposes to include members of the Minnesota National Guard in active service. Under current law, members of the U.S. military, reserves, and National Guard are considered nonresidents for income tax purposes while they are in active service outside of Minnesota. This change would extend that tax treatment to members of the Minnesota National Guard for time periods in which they were called to either federally funded state active service (such as airport security) or to state active service (such as natural disaster relief), within Minnesota.

Section 2. [Net Income.] conforms to federal changes to the definition of net income enacted as part of the Military Family Tax Relief Act of 2003 (P.L. 108-121).

Section 3. [Subtractions from Taxable Income.] allows a subtraction for military pay received by members of the military stationed in Minnesota but domiciled in another state. The Department of Revenue is complying with this change to federal law.

Section 4. [Nonresident Ratio.] adjusts the nonresident ratio used in apportioning tax to Minnesota for the subtraction for military pay received by members of the military stationed in Minnesota but domiciled in another state that is required under federal law.

This bill directs the formation of the Minnesota Health Care Purchasing Authority through interagency agreements. The purchasing authority will serve as the agency of state government responsible for all state purchasing of health care. In addition, the purchasing authority must provide a variety of reports and proposed legislation as required in the bill.

Subdivision 1 [PURCHASING AUTHORITY CREATED.] directs the Commissioner of Employee Relations to form the Minnesota Health Care Purchasing Authority through the use of interagency agreements among the Commissioners of Health, Human Services, Labor and Industry, Corrections, Commerce, and Administration. By December 15, 2006, the commissioners must submit a report and proposed legislation for creation of the purchasing authority.

Subdivision 2 [PRINCIPLES OF STATE PURCHASING.] requires the submission of an annual report at an unspecified date from the purchasing authority to the legislature and governor regarding the unified purchasing of health care services. Provides guidelines and standards for the report and plan.

Subdivision 3 [PURCHASING AND COVERAGE GUIDELINES.] directs the purchasing authority to convene a panel of health care policy experts to establish a process for creating guidelines for state government health care purchasing decisions.

Subdivision 4 [PUBLIC AND PRIVATE PURCHASERS.] requires the purchasing authority to submit a plan by December 15, 2005, that will allow a variety of public employers and nursing homes, to purchase a secure benefits set through the state purchasing authority. Beginning January 1, 2006, would allow the Commissioner of Employee Relations to expand health care

options available under the existing public employees insurance program. Allows private employees with 49 or fewer employees to purchase the secure benefits set from the state health care purchasing authority beginning January 1, 2009.

Subdivision 5 [COMMON STANDARDS FOR STATE PURCHASING AND REGULATION.] requires the state purchasing authority to submit a report and proposed legislation by December 15, 2006 that will require state purchasing and regulatory requirements to use common standards for quality and performance measurements.

Subdivision 6 [SECURE BENEFIT SET DEVELOPMENT.] requires the purchasing authority to define a secure benefit set, including preventive health services, prescription drug coverage, and catastrophic coverage.

Subdivision 7 [SPECIAL POPULATIONS.] requires the purchasing authority to consider special populations, including those who are elderly or disabled and persons with chronic conditions.

Subdivision 8 [COST AND QUALITY DISCLOSURE.] requires the purchasing authority to contract with a private, nonprofit organization to serve as a statewide source of comparative information on health care costs and quality.

Section 2 [EFFECTIVE DATE.] makes the entire bill effective July 1, 2005.

Bill Description

Senate File 1796-1E requires the commissioner of employee relations (DOER) in consultation with the commissioners of health, human services, labor and industry, corrections, commerce and administration and the Minnesota comprehensive health association (MCHA) board of directors to, by a certain date, enter into interagency agreements for formation of the Minnesota health care purchasing authority to implement a unified strategy and joint purchasing of health care services for the state, specifying certain strategy content requirements and requiring the commissioners to report to the legislature by a certain later date with proposed legislation for creation of the authority as a state agency; requiring the authority to annually prepare and submit to the governor and the legislature reports and plans for the unified purchasing of health care services, specifying certain plan requirements; requiring the authority to convene a panel of health care policy experts and health care providers to establish a process to select evidenced based guidelines based on sound research evidence and implement an integrated approach using the guidelines for purchasing decisions and coverage design and to prepare and submit to the governor and legislature, by a certain date, a plan to permit public employers, nursing homes and other long term care employers to purchase a secure benefit set through the authority, specifying certain secure benefit set health care services requirements; authorizing the commissioner of employee relations to expand the range of health coverage options available to purchase under the public employees insurance program including the option to purchase the secure benefit set, authorizing public employers, nursing homes and other long term care employers to purchase health coverage for employees through the program after a certain date and requiring the purchasing authority to include in the plan a process for permitting certain small private employers and individuals to purchase the secure benefit set through the authority after a certain later date: requiring authority submission of a report and proposed legislation to the governor and the legislature by a certain date requiring state purchasing and regulatory requirements to use common standards and measurement methods for quality and performance; requiring the authority to define a secure benefit set and in developing a plan for unified purchasing and the benefit set to consider the needs of special populations; requiring the authority to contract with a private nonprofit organization to serve as a statewide source of comparative information on health care costs and quality.

Summary:

The bill requires the formation of the Minnesota Health Care Purchasing Authority (MHCPA) for the purpose of implementing a unified strategy and joint purchasing of health care services for the state. The purchasing authority would exist as a distinct agency responsible for all state purchasing of health care.

Once created, the MHCPA shall:

- Prepare and submit to the governor and legislature a report and proposed legislation to require all state purchasing and regulatory requirements to use common standards and measurement methods for quality and performance.
- Prepare and submit a plan for permitting public employers, nursing homes and other long-term care facilities, and individuals to purchase a secure benefit set through the state purchasing authority, beginning January 1, 2006. The commissioner of employee relations may expand the range of options available through the public employees insurance program (PEIP) to include this secure benefit set.
- The plan described above shall include a process for permitting private small employers (49 or fewer employees) and individuals to purchase a secure benefit set through the state purchasing authority, beginning January 1, 2009.
- Prepare and submit to the governor and legislature an annual report and plan for the unified purchasing
 of health care services. The plan must:
 - o Promote personal choice and responsibility,
 - o Encourage and promote better health of patients and residents of the state,
 - Provide incentives to privately based health plans and health care delivery systems to improve efficiency and quality,
 - Use community standards and measurement methods for determining the value of specific health care services based on quality and performance,
 - Separate the health care purchasing functions of the state government from those activities relating to regulation and the delivery of services, but require the consistent use of the uniform quality and performance standards and methods for purchasing, regulation, and delivery of health care services,
 - Take into account the needs of special populations, including but not limited to, persons who are elderly or disabled and persons with chronic conditions,

- Convene a panel of health care policy experts and health care providers to:
 - o Establish a process to select evidence-based guidelines,
 - Implement an integrated approach using these guidelines for purchasing decisions and coverage design,
- Convene a panel of health policy experts to:
 - Define a secure benefit set that includes coverage for preventative health services, prescription drug coverage and catastrophic coverage.
- In cooperation with organizations representing consumers, employers, health care professionals, hospitals and other care facilities, health plan companies, etc, identify and contract with a private, nonprofit organization to serve as a statewide source of comparative information on health care costs and quality.

Joint Purchasing:

The proposal to coordinate state agency purchasing of health care services has been a subject of study and consideration in previous years. One example of considerable effort is the Alliance for Purchasing Excellence (APEX). A study of Health Care Purchasing Integration Strategies for DHS and DOER Programs was published in December 1995. This study provided background information related to the purchasing activities of both agencies, identified key issues relative to integration, and made recommendations to integrate only certain aspects of health care purchasing. As one result of this study, APEX was formed in1996 as a joint project focused on collaboratively purchasing health and dental insurance/care for state programs including (but not necessarily limited to):

- State Employee Group Insurance Program (SEGIP)
- Public Employees Insurance Program (PEIP)
- o Minnesota Employees Insurance Program (MEIP) no longer in existence
- o Medical Assistance
- o General Assistance Medical Care
- o Minnesota Care

Initial APEX planned activities included a joint dental contract, a joint health care contract, a study of the potential for direct contracting, exploration of a long-term care group insurance offering, and observation of a pilot program related to 24-hour care.

- A study of the potential for direct contracting resulted in a detailed report issued by APEX consultants that concluded direct contracting contained numerous obstacles to be a cost-effective strategy for purchasing health care for the DHS and DOER populations.
- A request for proposal (RFP) soliciting the joint dental contract was published in December 1996. Proposals submitted no later than February 3, 1997 were included in analysis of the responses. Both agencies participated in early dental negotiations but in May 1997, DHS was directed to terminate the process. Initial plans to pursue joint negotiations with the intended result of separate contracts proved to be ineffective.
- The other proposed joint projects were never implemented as joint projects. Some have been pursued by the individual agencies (i.e. long-term care).

The key issues identified in the December 1995 report are viewed by many to be core reasons why the APEX joint purchasing project was not effective. Those key issues include:

- The differing health and social service needs of the populations.
- Strategies implemented today must retain flexibility to respond to rapid changes in the delivery of health care.
- o Significant demographic differences create challenges to network design.
- Pooling of risk between programs is not appropriate.
- Other issues include difficulty of setting appropriate outcomes measures to reward performance of providers serving such diverse populations, coordination of financial incentives aimed at diverse populations, benefit structures are defined by different criteria, etc.

Potential Loss of Governmental Status for SEGIP or PEIP:

The inclusion of non-governmental employees in the SEGIP population would jeopardize the governmental status of the plan. DOER also has concerns about offering the secure benefit set to non-governmental employees through PEIP. DOER has interest in offering a secure benefit set through PEIP as a pilot project. However, offering the secure benefit set to non-governmental employees would also jeopardize the governmental plan

status of PEIP. The governmental plan status provides exemptions from many of the operational requirements of Title I of ERISA. These additional Title I requirements include:

- Reporting and communications, including: 1). Annual Report (Form 5500) financial return and attachments filed annually with IRS/DOL, 2). Summary Plan Description (SPD) to be provided to plan participants and beneficiaries on a periodic basis, 3). Summary of Material Modifications – requiring notifications of plan changes to be sent to plan participants within a specified time period, 4). Summary Annual Report of plan finances to be provided to plan participants, 5). Record Retention Requirements – all records underlying the Annual Report are required to be maintained for a period of at least six years.
- Fiduciary, Bonding and Liability: 1). Fiduciary Duties Fiduciaries of the plan are held to high standards of conduct and accountability. Certain transactions are prohibited by statute to avoid potential conflicts of interest, 2). Bonding Plan officials and fiduciaries must be bonded to protect against loss due to malfeasance, 3). Criminal and Civil Lawsuits Provides for criminal penalties against those who violate the Act. Allows civil lawsuits by participants and the government against the Plan and its fiduciaries.
- Procedural: 1). Claims Procedures Plan must specify claims procedures in accordance with federal regulations, 2). COBRA Continuation Covered plans must provide continuation coverage rights to eligible employees, 3). QMCSO's Covered plans must provide coverage to children of a divorced plan participant where court order (known as a Qualified Medical Child Support Order) specifically requires same, 4). HIPAA Creditable Coverage and Medical Privacy Requirements Compliance required even for exempt plan due to HHS regulations, 5). Required Coverage Plans required to provide certain coverage for mothers and newborn children, participants accessing mental health benefits, and those undergoing mastectomies.
- Investigatory Authority DOL/IRS authorized to investigate plan operations.
- Preemption of State Laws Plan, if subject to Title I, is then not subject to inconsistent state laws, except those which regulate insurance.

Implementation Window:

The proposed legislation requires the MHCPA to submit to the governor and legislature by December 15, 2005, a plan to permit public employers, nursing homes and long-term care employers to purchase a secure benefit set. The proposed legislation allows this secure benefit set to be offered through PEIP beginning January 1, 2006. Insufficient time has been allowed for a successful implementation of the offering. Program management of PEIP requires 3-6 months for the development of an SPD, and marketing and underwriting the product to employers interested in purchasing the secure benefit set offering.

Assumptions

DOER is unable to determine, with any reasonable accuracy, any cost to the Advantage health plan. The costs presented below are administrative costs only.

The commissioner of employee relations is required to take a leadership role in the formation of the MHCPA. DOER anticipates expense due to demands on DOER staff and the potential need for consulting and actuarial services.

Start-Up Expense:

DOER estimates the activities related to the development of the secure benefit set to consume 100% of the time of one senior professional level staff person for the six-month period, July 1, 1005 through December 31, 2005.

DOER estimates the need for actuarial and consulting services to support the rapid development of the secure benefit set. These services will be needed throughout the six-month period, July 1, 2005 through December 31, 2005. DOER estimates the time needed to be 200 hours at an estimated cost of \$212 per hour.

Ongoing Administration Expense:

DOER estimates the activities related to the formation of the MHCPA, and the ongoing responsibilities of reporting and implementation of the various bill requirements to consume 100% of the time of one senior professional level staff person on an ongoing basis.

DOER estimates the need for ongoing consulting and actuarial support for the activities of the MHCPA to remain consistent at the level of 400 hours per year at an estimated cost of \$212/hour.
