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




Minnesota is Aging

Minnesota's Aging Network

An infrastructure that annually supports over 215,000 older Minnesotans and caregivers

Minnesota Board on Aging

7 Area Agencies on Aging

100 Contracted Service Providers & over 330,000 Volunteer Hours

Provides Services & Supports to 1 in 5 Older Minnesotans

Who We Serve

Services are targeted to those in greatest social and economic need.

- Individuals with limited means who are not yet eligible for Elderly Waiver or Alternative Care.
- High risk for falling into public safety net and use of high-cost services.







Role of Older Americans Act

The Board administers the **Older Americans Act** in Minnesota

- Long-Term Care Options Counseling
- Service and System Development
- Service funding: \$40.5 million annually
 - \$ 19.6 Million federal funds (mostly Older Americans Act)
 - \$ 3.6 Million state funds
 - \$ 17.3 Million local/match







Role of Area Agencies on Aging

- Administer funding for Older Americans Act services through contracts with local providers
- Local Advisory Boards provide direction regarding the best ways to meet local needs and adjust to the changing demographics
- The funding formula is based on both the state and regional demographics







Impact of Sequestration

- Minnesota's Older Americans Act-funded services are impacted by automatic, acrossthe-board cuts.
- Impact in 2013: Area Agencies on Aging can maintain current levels of service by tapping reserves or making short-term adjustments.
- Impact in 2014 and beyond: Programs will be significantly impacted.





Impact of Sequestration Cuts

- Senior Nutrition
 - Congregate meals 7.19%
 - Home-delivered meals 5.24%
 - NSIP 5.60%
- Supportive Services 5.64%
- Health Promotion Disease Prevention 6.18%
- Caregiver Support Services 5.60%
- Elder Abuse 4.49%
- Ombudsman 5.60%





MBA/AAA Action

- Using new tools to better analyze participant data to understand who is using our services and where.
 - Utilization Are we providing enough service to those who need it?
 - Targeting Are we targeting services to those most in need?
 - Efficiency Are our programs operating in an efficient manner?
