Section 1 permits a bank that has its main office in the city of Pine River to open a branch bank in Burns Township (Anoka County). Legislative action is required for a bank to open a branch in a township. Requires the establishment of this branch to go through the usual Department of Commerce procedures for approval of a new branch, except where those procedures are inconsistent with this bill. Requires approval of the Burns Town Board in order for this bill to become effective.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
Section 1. [BURNS TOWNSHIP; DETACHED BANKING FACILITY.]
(a) With prior approval of the commissioner of commerce, a
bank operating its principal office in the city of Pine River may establish and maintain not more than one detached facility in Burns Township. A bank desiring to establish such a detached
facility must follow the approval procedure prescribed in
Minnesota Statutes, section 47.54. The establishment of a
detached facility under this section is subject to Minnesota
Statutes, sections 47.51 to 47.57 , except to the extent those
sections are inconsistent with this section.
(b) Paragraph (a) is effective the day after compliance by
the governing body of Burns Township with Minnesota Statutes, section 645.021 , subdivision 3 .

# S.F. No. 1459 - School Employee Health Insurance Pool

Section 1 establishes the school employee insurance plan.
Subdivision 1 defines the terms "eligible employee" and "eligible employer." An eligible employer is a school district or a related entity listed in the definition.

Subdivision 2 creates a board to create and administer the health insurance pool. The board would be a public corporation subject to chapter 317A, except as otherwise provided. The state is not liable for the obligations of the corporation. The board expires if coverage is not offered by December 15, 2008.

Subdivision 3 provides that the board has 14 members: seven appointed by school employee unions and seven appointed by the Minnesota School Boards Association. Requires that initial appointments to the board be made by August 1, 2005. Provides that board members are eligible for reimbursement of expenses on the same basis as members of other staterelated boards. Requires the board to arrange for ways of resolving disputes within the board to avoid deadlocks. Requires the board to establish governance requirements.

Subdivision 4 requires that the health coverage be available to all eligible employees of eligible employers and that eligible employers provide health coverage only through the pool. Requires the board to offer more than one health plan and allows the board to establish more than one tier of premium rates for a plan. Permits geographic variations. Requires plans to comply with specified health insurance laws and provide the optimal combination of coverage, cost, choice, and stability. The plans offered must be approved by the Commissioner of Commerce. Requires claims reserves, stabilization reserves, reinsurance, and other features to achieve stability and solvency. Permits the board to decide whether the
health plans should be fully insured, self-insured, or some combination. Requires the health plans to include disease management and consumer education, including wellness programs, and measures to encourage wise use of health coverage. Requires health plans providing coverage to employees of eligible employers within two years prior to the effective date of this section to provide to the board, on request, specified aggregate claims data.

Subdivision 5 requires the board to report to the Legislature by January 15, 2007, on final design for the pool. Legislative changes needed to ensure conformance with specified health insurance laws must be included in the report.

Subdivision 6 requires periodic reporting by the board to the Legislature summarizing and evaluating performance of the pool.

Section 2 provides an appropriation of an unspecified amount from the general fund as a loan for start-up costs. Requires that the loan be repaid to the general fund over ten years beginning in the 2008 fiscal year.

(d) Board members are eligible for compensation and expense reimbursement under section 15.0575, subdivision 3.
(e) The board must arrange for one or more methods of dispute resolution so as to minimize the possibility of deadlocks.
(f) The board shall establish governance requirements, including staggered terms, term limits, quorum, a plan of operation, and audit provisions.
Subd. 4. [DESIGN AND NATURE OF PLAN.] (a) Health coverage offered through the Minnesota School Employee Insurance Pool shall be made available by the board to all eligible employees of eligible employers, as defined in subdivision 1.
(b) If an eligible employer provides health coverage or
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money to purchase health coverage to eligible employees, the coverage must be provided or purchased only through the health plans offered by the board.
(c) The board must offer more than one health plan and may establish more than one tier of premium rates for any specific plan. Plans and premium rates may vary across geographic regions established by the board. The health plans must comply with chapters $62 \mathrm{~A}, 62 \mathrm{~J}, 62 \mathrm{M}$, and 62 Q , and must provide the optimal combination of coverage, cost, choice, and stability in the judgment of the board. All health plans offered must be approved by the commissioner of commerce.
(d) The board must include claims reserves, stabilization reserves, reinsurance, and other features that, in the judgment of the board, will result in long-term stability and solvency of the health plans offered.
(e) The board may determine whether the health plans should be fully insured through a health carrier licensed in this state, self-insured, or a combination of those two alternatives.
(f) The health plans must include disease management and consumer education, including wellness programs and measures encouraging the wise use of health coverage, to the extent determined to be appropriate by the board.
(h) Upon request of the board, health plans that are providing or have provided coverage to employees of eligible employers within two years prior to the effective date of this section, shall provide to the board at no charge nonidentifiable aggregate claims data for that coverage. The information must include data relating to employee group benefit sets, demographics, and claims experience. Notwithstanding section 13.203, Minnesota service cooperatives must also comply with this paragraph.

Subd. 5. [REPORT.] The board shall report to the legislature by January 15, 2007, on a final design for the pool that complies with subdivision 4 and on governance reguirements for the board, including staggered terms, term limits, quorum, and a plan of operation and audit provisions. The report must

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include any legislative changes necessary to ensure conformance

## What is the problem?

- School districts and their employees are confronted with double-digit increases in health care
- School districts and employees are being forced to reduce or even eliminate insurance coverage.
- Without the necessary reforms in this bill, all of these problems will continue to get worse.



## STATEWIDE HEALTH INSURANCE FOR SCHOOL EMPLOYEES What is it?

HF 517 and SF 1459 are bills designed to create a statewide health insurance program for all school district employees and their families. The legislation is built on the state's own feasibility study that established the viability of the concept and estimated cost savings of approximately $\$ 223$ million over the first six years of implementation.

## STATEWIDE HEALTH INSURANCE FOR SCHOOL EMPLOYEES What does the legislation do?

In short, the statewide health-insurance legislation would:

- Establish a risk pool of about 200,000 individuals, which would reform the current approach to health care coverage for school employees and generate significant cost savings. This will:
- Spread the costs of catastrophic claims across a much larger population;
- Reduce the likelihood of spikes in insurance premiums.
- Create a labor-management committee, with equal representation between labor and management, to develop and oversee all aspects of the program. This will:
o Provide continued local control through district and union negotiations. Individual school districts and the union will still determine which plan to offer, how much the
 district will contribute toward the premiums, and who is eligible for insurance.
H.F. 517/S.F. 1459 School Health Care Purchasing Pool

The Minnesota Chamber of Commerce opposes H.F. 517/S.F. 1459 which creates a mandatory statewide teacher health care pool. The Chamber has several concerns with this legislation.

1. It shifts costs of the Minnesota Comprehensive Health Association (MCHA) and premium taxes to the $30 \%$ of small employers, individuals and farmers who purchase insurance in the fully insured private market. Under this plan schools would no longer pay health care taxes. According to the Milliman report, 36 percent of the projected savings in this pool are the direct result of this cost shift. This bill would lower the collections of MCHA by $\$ 7.3$ million in school year $2006 / 2007$ and $\$ 7.9$ million in 2007/2008. In 1997, the MCHA assessment was $\$ 37$ million dollars with $35 \%$ of the market paying into the program. In 2004, the assessment was $\$ 102$ million with $30 \%$ of the market paying the bill. This bill would reduce the number paying into the MCHA program to 24 percent. As the following chart indicates, the MCHA program is growing significantly. In 2004, the MCHA assessment overtook the provider tax as the largest of the health care taxes, accounting for 2.1 percent of premium.

Growth in MCHA Assessment (in millions)


The projected savings to the school health plan in HMO and indemnity premium taxes is estimated to be $\$ 6.5$ million in school year 2006/2007 and $\$ 7.1$ million in $2007 / 2008$. The indemnity portion of the premium taxes is paid into the general fund, thus creating a hole in the general fund.
2. Several of the assumptions that are used to arrive at this pool producing savings are flawed and are not available to other types of pooling or other arrangements in the market. The attachment point of $\$ 500,000$ for stop loss is unrealistically high. Similar attachment points for pools for small and medium sized employers are around $\$ 75,000$. The reserve requirements proposed are significantly less that what would be approved in a private purchasing pool. Such assumptions could affect the stability of the pool and could open the state to liability issues if this pool were to fail.

Re: Hopkins Health Insurance Experience
Over the past years, the Hopkins School District has taken the initiative to provide employees with a health insurance plan that provides strong coverage and minimizes the dramatic premium increases experienced by other private and public agencies.

Through a series of partnerships, negotiations, plan changes, and education, Hopkins experienced a $7.5 \%$ increase in premiums for the 2003-2004 school year, a $0 \%$ increase in premiums for the 2004-2005 school year, and a $0 \%$ increase for the 2005-2006 school year. In comparison, market rate increases were near a $10 \%$ local and $18 \%$ national trend.

Steps the Hopkins District has taken to manage the premium increase include:

- Moving to a self-insured plan from a fully insured plan (the local administration of the plan is handled through an insurance committee that is comprised of union stewards and district benefit, human resources, and business services administrators).
- Adopting a high deductible plan design (The employee was responsible for the first $\$ 1,500.00-2,500$ of medical costs from their own pocket which was off-set by a negotiated VEBA, voluntary employee benefit account, HRA of \$750.00).
- Negotiating with local bargaining units and creating a partnership that would minimize the employee out-of-pocket risk associated with high deductible plans (The VEBA amounts are determined at the bargaining table).
- Educating employees about the use of Flexible spending dollars, VEBA dollars, and the ability to grow VEBA accounts through managing health care decisions employees make.
- Monitoring the administrative, claim, and pharmacy costs associated with the selfinsurance fund.
- Partnering with our insurance broker, CBIZ, and health educators, Health Providers Network, to provide employees with educational experiences that train them on the health benefits covered under the plans and the information needed to make wise health care choices in the present market.
- Conducting Health Risk Assessments to determine educational materials and promotional programs that target the population's health risks and form a preventative measure that ultimately will help reduce claims and rehabilitation expenses.

Results of the Hopkins plan include:

- Low premium increases.
- A significant migration of employees to the high deductible plan (The plan began in 2001 and as of this month, we have $74 \%$ of the members on the high deductible plan).
- VEBA accounts that continue to grow (We now have over 70\% of the high deductible participants who have VEBA balances higher than their maximum out-of-pocket expenses in a given year).
- A healthy VEBA total that allows the employer to reduce administrative costs by using the interest earned from the VEBA account to pay administrative expenses.
- More consumer driven options are entering into the insurance committee discussions (This month the committee is looking at how to better inform members about therapy class pharmacy products that could cut claims another 100,000 a year).
- Wellness initiatives with partners in the District and outside of the District that can serve as an additional preventative measure.
- A healthy self-insurance reserve account that allows Hopkins to maintain low premium increases (this fund balance continues to maintain itself and even grow).
- A sense of satisfaction between labor and management that together we have created a vehicle to address a concern that other organizations have yet to address.
- A sense of pride in the ability to place dollars in other areas and not have to absorb 10 to $20 \%$ increases in health insurance premiums or pass this cost along to employees.

Losses likely to occur if we are forced to move to a state mandated plan

- More restrictive options at the bargaining table.
- Inability to have a direct benefit for wellness activities (There is no incentive to participate in wellness activities if it has no impact on local heath care premiums or out of pocket expenses).
- Loss of creative plan designs that are better designed to the local population's need rather than the aggregate of the whole.
- Increase in premium costs due to absorbing the risks associated with those groups who have not established efforts to minimize claims.
- No control over the resources the employer places into health care-Presently, we have a collective group determining how to best use the reserve dollars to target the needs of the District and best deliver services with reserve dollars and wellness purchases.
- Possible loss of VEBA plans.
- Total cost of a fully insured plan would increase Hopkins premiums
- Administrative costs would increase as the ability to negotiate those costs as reserves increase would no longer be a possibility.
- Loss of employee ownership in the District plan.

With careful and cooperative planning, the Hopkins efforts have created a good model. The model allows for a successful program and brings the employer and employee units into a cooperative effort to manage, administrate, and support employee benefits. Employees who receive the benefits become consumers in a process that allows them to take ownership of their health care decisions. It also places them in an opportune position to learn more about reducing risks to financially benefit themselves and their dependents.

A mandatory state-wide program will impact Districts that have taken the initiative to manage health care costs by placing the burden on their reserves to buy down the increase in premium that self-insured Districts have been able to manage by having built reserves over time. This action takes the success of those who have managed the system well and asks them to bear an unfair burden of supporting a larger population that has not managed to stay on top of this issue. It also deprives local organizations of the ability gain control of a locally developed plan that meets member needs.

The Hopkins plan proves that with planning and collaboration there are other models to consider before rushing to a mandatory system that asks those who are successful to bear the burden for those who have not been. I would request that legislative members consider the impact to successful programs if this bill becomes law. An ability for Districts to opt out of the plan would help establish a provision that would cause successful districts such as Hopkins no harm.

# SF 1459 <br> Watertown-Mayer ISD 111 Mandatory Statewide Health Insurance For School District Employees and Retirees 

## Let it be resolved that Education Minnesota Watertown-Mayer ISD 111 opposes the plan to require that all school employees be placed in a mandatory statewide health insurance plan. Approved March 18, 2005



How did ISD 111 move from a $21 \%$ premium increase in 2000 to a $3 \%$ premium increase in 2004?

## Education:

$\Rightarrow$ Discuss health insurance with the stakeholders. Describe the plan to them. We are self-insured through Resource Training and Solutions in St. Cloud, MN. We are pooled with several other school districts and the claims are handled through an administrative agreement with Blue Cross Blue Shield. The pool has protected itself with stop-loss on large claims and maintains a reserve fund for unexpectedly high claims. We do not have to pay the Minnesota Care tax because we are self-insured.
> Why did we have a $21 \%$ increase in 2000 ? What things can we do proactively to assure that we don't see this happen again the following year? Each individual has a responsibility to the group as a whole to use this insurance benefit wisely. Wellness is emphasized. Yearly physicals and mammograms are fully covered. Wellness activities are employed throughout the workplace each year. BCBS provides assistance to those individuals with chronic health problems.

- Be smart health care consumers. Ask questions about a procedure and discuss alternate methods of treatment. An ISD111 teacher that recently visited a doctor about a sinus infection she tends to have once each year was informed that she would be scheduled for an MRI the next day. This teacher told the doctor that she did not want the MRI and that she was going to see her regular doctor regarding her sinus infection. It was taken care of with a prescription for an antibiotic and did not require a procedure costing hundreds of dollars. All members know the high cost of urgent care and emergency room visits and will wait until they can visit the clinic if it is not a true emergency. Families do not take their children in every time they have a sniffle. They learn to recognize minor viral infections and take their children to the doctor only when necessary.


## Plan Design and Provider:

Is our plan affordable and adequate for our group? ISD111 provides two basic plans for the employees. Each year before renewal we ask questions such as: Should we adjust deductibles or change our preferred provider network? Is Resource Training and Solutions the most efficient and affordable way to obtain health insurance for our district? Would an HSA or HRA be more cost effective? Is our plan fair to our youngest group members all the way to retirees? The ISD111 insurance committee requested presentations on Health Saving Accounts, Health Reimbursement Accounts and VEBAs form several providers. The committee was in the process of selecting the best plan and provider for an HRA when the legislation requiring mandatory statewide health insurance was introduced last session. The selection has been delayed until the outcome of this legislation is known.
" Why does Education Minnesota Watertown-Mayer Oppose This Legislation?

1. It is unfair to those districts that actively worked each year at providing quality health insurance at an affordable price. (see graph with data from committee commissioned by the legislature)
2. School employees have always included health insurance as one part of a total compensation package bargained at the district level and most districts have significantly different contributions and coverage from one another.
3. Mandatory plans stifle innovation and limit those districts attempting to implement new strategies such as HSA, HRA, and VEBA.
4. Increased cost to some districts and some school employees by a mandatory plan will cause financial hardships that might negatively impact student learning due to budget constraints.

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## SF 1459 Will Have Both Short and Long

 Term Adverse Effects on Counties- Although SF 1459 only specifically addresses school districts and their employees and retirees, its indirect impacts will affect counties, their employees and their taxpayers in the short and long term



## Long Term Impact

- If Counties Follow the School Districts' Lead (if SF 1459 is enacted), They Will:
-Lose Present Option to Design Health Care Benefit Packages that Best Serve Their Employees and Taxpayers
- Under SF 1459 and a possible future county plan of a similar nature, some employees will loose benefits, cash in lieu of health insurance and/or employers and employees will pay more for health care insurance
- Assume Liability for Their Pool's Claims in Excess of Premiums
- No such liability currently exists for counties that purchase traditional health insurance or for self-insured plans that purchase stop loss coverage
