Ken Backhus, Senate Counsel, described the differences between S.F. 1223 and last year's similar legislation authored by Senator McGinn.

Senator Ranum moved an oral amendment to the A-1 amendment, Page 1, Line 8, after "<u>officer</u>" and insert "<u>, knowing that the person is a peace officer</u>." Page 1, Line 14-16, delete "<u>public officer</u>, as defined in section 609.415, subdivision 1, or <u>an employee thereof</u>"

Page 1, Line 14, after "<u>a</u>" insert "<u>peace officer</u>"

Page 1, Line 25, delete "shall" and insert "may"

Page 1, Line 28, after "<u>allegation</u>" delete "<u>unless the court makes a specific written</u> <u>finding that restitution would be inappropriate under the circumstances. A restitution</u> <u>award may not exceed \$3,000.</u>"

Motion prevailed.

Senator Skoglund moved to divide the A-1 amendment into two parts.

Senator Foley with advice from Counsel ruled that the A-1 amendment is not divisible.

Senator McGinn moved the A-1 amendment, as amended.

Senator Foley was in doubt on the motion and called for division.

Motion prevailed.

Senator McGinn moved that S.F. 1223, as amended be passed.

Motion prevailed.

Senator Anderson, chief author of S.F. 1139 (Gang member crimes against children penalty increase).

Maggie Doran, Ben Doran's mother, testified in support of the bill.

Jim Limb, Parents of Murdered Children, testified in support of the bill.

Sheriff Bob Fletcher, Minnesota Gang Strike Task Force Oversight Council, testified in support of the bill.

Senator Kleis moved the A-3 amendment.

Senator Kleis withdraws the A-3 amendment.

Senator Kleis moved to lay S.F. 1139 on the table.

Senator Neuville moved an oral amendment, -Delete everything except the removal of the sunset.

Motion failed.

Senator Kleis moved that S.F. 1201, as amended, be recommended to pass and rereferred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Senator Lourey, chief author of S.F. 1483 (Minnesota emergency health powers act provisions modifications).

Doug Stang, Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Health, testified in support of the bill.
