• Senator Hottinger introduced the bill, which is a key bill to the Early Childhood Committee. Senator Kubly had the gavel.

MOTION: Senator Hottinger moved the A-1 Amendment

MOTION: Senator Pappas moved an oral Amendment, Page 1, Line 23, strike "at least 51" and insert "more than 50"

→ Passed

MOTION: Senator Kierlin moved an oral Amendment, Page 2, Line 14, strike "pilot" and after projects insert ", including pilot projects,"

- → Passed
 - Rob Johnson, Senior Vice President, Cargill Corporation, supports early learning as a business initiative. Mr. Johnson noted there is a readiness gap, it is more cost-effective to close the gap at an early age than to try and catch up later, and MELF is a great strategy to close the readiness gap.
 - Byron Laher, United Way, spoke about the need to have our children ready for school, and to be productive while in school.
 - Zoe Nicholie, Ready 4 K, spoke about how high quality programs can close the readiness gap.
 - Dr. Karen Effrem, Ed Watch, spoke to how early learning programs are not cost effective. Dr. Effrem also spoke about how the studies do not account for the downside of early education and care.
 - Senator Hottinger gave closing comments to the committee about the bill. Sen. Hottinger said that this is a wonderful opportunity to help children interact with each other, as well as an opportunity to work with the private sector.

MOTION: Senator Hottinger moved that S.F. 907 be recommended to pass as amended, and to be included in the Omnibus Bill.

AGENDA ITEM #2: S.F. 905 (Kubly) Providing for coordination of early care and education programs

• Senator Kubly gave the introduction to the bill, providing that three state agencies coordinate their early childhood learning efforts. Sen. Hottinger had the gavel.

MOTION: Senator Kubly moved the A-1 Amendment.

- → Passed
 - Zoe Nicholie, Ready 4 K, spoke about how too often services are not well coordinated or well advertised to parents. This bill can help.
 - Cindy Toppin, Vice President, Lifetrack Resources, is frustrated by the current lack of coordination, and not having the input of early learning programs.

• Dr. Karen Effrem, Ed Watch, gave her grave concerns of dictating kids' lives. She stated that home visiting programs have the potential to violate 4th Amendment rights of unreasonable search and seizure.

MOTION: Senator Kubly moved S.F. 905 as amendment be laid over and recommended for possible inclusion in the omnibus bill.

• Senator Wergin raised her concerns with the bill. She was unable to vote for it, because it does not have a voluntary feel for it, and her concerns of re-writing possible Medicad legislation.
