Unless otherwise specified, the appropriations in this article are available for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007. Appropriations in this article that are encumbered under contract, including grant contracts, on or before June 30, 2007, are available until June 30, 2009. All the appropriations in this article are onetime appropriations.

Notwithstanding any other law enacted during the 2006 regular legislative session, the maximum total general fund appropriation authorized for the purposes of this article under all laws enacted during the 2006 regular legislative session is \$20,000,000. Any amounts appropriated from the general fund in any other law enacted during the 2006 regular legislative session that would cause the general fund appropriations to exceed \$20,000,000 are canceled.

The appropriations in this article must be used to protect, restore, and preserve the quality of Minnesota's surface waters. Allowable activities include surface water assessments, program activities that target identified impairments, and development of total maximum daily load studies (TMDL's) as required by section 303(d) of the federal Clean Water Act, United States Code, title 33, section 1313(d) and applicable federal regulations.







Free brochures describing each of the recreation areas and additional information of interest are available upon request.




Fees And Regulations






Lake Winnibigoshish (67,000 acres in size, with 141 miles of shoreline) fills a basin formed by a huge ice block left behind by a receding glacier, and is surrounded by glacial deposits. The Ojibwa named it "miserable-wretched-dirty-water" (Winnibigoshish) because of the effect of storm winds churning up the muddy bottom. Winnibigoshish Dam was the first constructed in the system of six headwater dams. It is located on the Mississippi River, 170 river miles from its source in Lake Itasca and 2,178 river miles from its mouth at the Gulf Coast.



Sandy Lake Recreation Area



Big Sandy Lake (9,400 acres and 77 miles of shoreline) is located on the canoe route that linked Lake Superior and the Mississippi River. Archaeological evidence indicates that Native Americans had established villages on the lake after the glaciers retreated -- 10,000 years ago. The Northwest Fur Company established a major fur trading post at the western end of the lake in the late 1700's. Sandy Lake Dam, completed in 1895, controls the runoff from a 421 square mile drainage area including eight lakes. The old lock house has been renovated to display interpretive exhibits.





Gull Lake Dam controls the runoff from 237 square miles of drainage area and the ten lakes of the Gull Lake Chain. The dam raised the lake level approximately five feet. The area around Gull Lake Dam was inhabited several times since 800 B.C. and is the site of several Aboriginal burial mounds.

Gull Lake occupies a basin formed by a receding glacier. In the early 1900s, it provided water for navigation in the Mississippi River below the Twin Cities, for floating logs to saw mills and for powering flour and lumber mills. Now, the dam is utilized for flood control and to enhance recreation and wildlife.





The Leech Lake campground is located in the heart of the Chippewa National Forest in Federal Dam, Minn., and is best known for its fishing and boat access to Portage Bay on Leech Lake. Excellent opportunities are available for walleye, perch, bass, northern pike and musky, where every cast has the potential to yield a true trophy. Leech Lake, particularly Portage Bay, is home to the legendary Musky Rampage of 1955. The campground offers well-maintained campsites, showers, clean facilities and boat mooring. Experience picturesque sunsets, autumn colors or just peaceful evenings around the campfire where the only "noise" you hear will be loons in the distance. Relax and enjoy your visit!

Leech Lake fills a basin formed by receding glaciers. The 126,000 acre reservoir, formed upon construction of the dam in 1884, controls the runoff from a 1,163 square mile drainage area, contains 316 miles of shoreline and encompasses about 14 natural lakes. Lake levels were raised approximately two feet after impoundment.

The dam is located on the Leech Lake River, 214 river miles from the source of the Mississippi River at Lake Itasca, 27 river miles from the confluence with the Mississippi, and approximately 2,188 river miles from the mouth at the Gulf Coast.




The Pine River, a tributary of the Mississippi River, was once a creek connecting Crosslake with Upper and Lower Whitefish Lakes which are surrounded by 13 other natural lakes. The construction of the dam at Crosslake raised the water level, making channels between these lakes and forming the Pine River Reservoir, which is better known as the Whitefish Chain of Lakes. This 13,660-acre body of water, with its 119 miles of shoreline, provides dozens of interesting bays for pleasure boating and fishing.
