

1.1 **Senator Rosen from the Committee on Finance, to which was re-referred**

1.2 **S.F. No. 2969:** A bill for an act relating to natural resources; appropriating money from
1.3 the outdoor heritage fund.

1.4 Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

1.5 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.6 "Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS.

1.7 The sums shown in the columns marked "Appropriations" are appropriated to the agencies
1.8 and for the purposes specified in this act. The appropriations are from the outdoor heritage
1.9 fund for the fiscal year indicated for each purpose. The figures "2022" and "2023" used in
1.10 this act mean that the appropriations listed under the figure are available for the fiscal year
1.11 ending June 30, 2022, and June 30, 2023, respectively. The "first year" is fiscal year 2022.
1.12 The "second year" is fiscal year 2023. The "biennium" is fiscal years 2022 and 2023. The
1.13 appropriations in this act are onetime appropriations.

 20.32 state, and national organizations for enhancing,
 20.33 restoring, or protecting forests, wetlands,
 20.34 prairies, or habitat for fish, game, or wildlife
 20.35 in Minnesota. Of this amount, at least

21.1 \$2,500,000 is for grants in the seven-county


