adopted after construction begins that would require additional capital investment is required

If the commissioner determines that an 8.18 application is incomplete, the notice to the applicant must enumerate all deficiencies, citing 8.19 specific provisions of the applicable rules and statutes, and advise the applicant on how the 8.20 deficiencies can be remedied. If the commissioner determines that the application is complete, 8.21 the notice must confirm the application's tier 1 or tier 2 permit status. 9.16	(ii) a determination of which specific application or applications will be necessary to
9.17	complete the project;
9.18	(iii) a statement notifying the applicant if the specific permit being sought requires a
9.19	mandatory public hearing or comment period;
9.20	(iv) a review of the timetable established in the permit review program for the specific
9.21	permit being sought; and
9.22	(v) a determination of what information must be included in the application, including
9.23	a description of any required modeling or testing.
9.24	(g) The applicant may select a permit professional to undertake the preparation of the
9.25	permit application and draft permit.
9.26	(h) If a preapplication meeting was held, the agency shall, within seven business days
9.27	of receipt of an application, notify the applicant and submitting permit professional that the
9.28	application is complete or is denied, specifying the deficiencies of the application.
9.29	(i) Upon receipt of notice that the application is complete, the permit professional shall
9.30	submit to the agency a timetable for submitting a draft permit. The permit professional shall
9.31	submit a draft permit on or before the date provided in the timetable. Within 60 days after

the close of the public comment period, the commissioner shall notify the applicant whetherthe permit can be issued.

(1) will result in the collection, in the aggregate, from the sources listed in paragraph
(b), of an amount not less than \$25 per ton of each volatile organic compound; pollutant
regulated under United States Code, title 42, section 7411 or 7412 (section 111 or 112 of
the federal Clean Air Act); and each pollutant, except carbon monoxide, for which a national
primary ambient air quality standard has been promulgated;

(2) may result in the collection, in the aggregate, from the sources listed in paragraph
(b), of an amount not less than \$25 per ton of each pollutant not listed in clause (1) that is
regulated under this chapter or air quality rules adopted under this chapter; and

(3) shall collect, in the aggregate, from the sources listed in paragraph (b), the amount
needed to match grant funds received by the state under United States Code, title 42, section
7405 (section 105 of the federal Clean Air Act).

(b) The board shall by rule establish categories of actions for which environmental
