1.5	Section 1. [124D.351] YOUTH SKILL PATH PROGRAM.
1.6	Subdivision 1. Purpose. The purpose of this section is to promote career pathway
1.7	opportunities that combine high school career and technical education and youth skills
1.8	training programs with postsecondary credit, dual training and registered apprenticeship
1.9	programs, and employment.
1.10	Subd. 2. Definitions. (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have the
1.11	meanings given.
1.12	(b) "Career and technical education dual credit program" means a postsecondary career
1.13	or technical education course under section 124D.09, subdivision 5; a secondary course that
1.14	has a current articulation agreement for postsecondary credit hours with a participating
1.15	institution; or a youth skills training program that awards postsecondary credit to students.
1.16	(c) "Eligible student" means a student who is in grade 11 or 12, or is age 16 or older,
1.17	and is enrolled in a public school, an American Indian-controlled Tribal contract or grant
1.18	school eligible for aid under section 124D.83, a nonpublic school, or is a homeschool student.
1.19	(d) "Employment-based training" means a registered apprenticeship or apprenticeship
1.20	readiness program, a dual-training program, a workforce training program at an opportunities
1.21	industrialization center, or other work-based learning programs in which the student has
1.22	paid employment.

1 Subd.	3. List of youth skill path programs. The Departments of Education and Labor
2 <u>must join</u>	tly develop a list of programs for high school students that combine career and
technical	education dual credit with employment-based training to be designated as youth
skill path	programs. The list must be published on the websites of the Department of
Education	n, the Department of Labor, the Department of Employment and Economic
Developn	nent, and the Office of Higher Education. Youth skill path programs must be
identified	in skilled occupations, including advanced manufacturing, health care services,
informati	on technology, agriculture, transportation, childcare, and law enforcement.

who is in	grade 11 or 12, is age 16 or older, or is enrolled in a nonpublic school or

Subd.	5. Eligible institution. (a) A Minnesota state college or university, an institution
licensed o	or registered as a postsecondary institution by the Office of Higher Education, or
an institu	tion exempt from the provisions of sections 136A.61 to 136A.71 or 136A.822 to
136A.834	as approved by the Office of Higher Education may provide a postsecondary
options en	nrollment career and technical education course for eligible students in a youth
skill path	program.
<u>(b) Yo</u>	outh skill path programs must include career and technical education dual credit
program	courses and employment-based training but must not be required to be completed
concurrer	ntly.
Subd.	6. Exemption. The Department of Labor must grant an exemption from the
provision	s of chapter 181A for student learners in a youth skill path program. For the
operation	of equipment and machinery defined as hazardous, employment-based training
for studer	nts 16 or 17 years of age may be simulated cooperatively at a training site.
