Re: Support for SF 2169 – Additional funding for Border-to-Border Broadband Grant Program and continuation of support for broadband deployment in lower density areas

Dear Chair Putnam and members of the Senate Agriculture, Broadband, and Rural Development Committee:

The League of Minnesota Cities appreciates the opportunity to provide our comments in support of SF 2169 (Seeberger) as amended that provides much needed additional funding for the Border-to-Border Broadband Grant Program and a continuation for the grant to be more effective in lower density areas of the state to deploy broadband infrastructure more effectively. SF 2169 is in line with the League's priorities to implement state solutions and deploy resources to ensure broadband is universally accessible to all Minnesota residents and businesses and both provisions are needed to keep Minnesota on track to meeting its statutory speed goal of universal statewide access to reliable broadband at 100Mbps/20Mbps speeds by 2026.

Reliable broadband internet access is essential infrastructure needed by cities and their residents to compete in a global digital economy. Cities across Minnesota are working diligently to grow their local economies and ensure that residents and local businesses can access critical services and compete in an increasingly more digital world no matter where they are in the state. However, many communities in Minnesota lack the infrastructure needed to provide reliable broadband at affordable prices. Because of high fixed costs for broadband infrastructure, low population density, and lack of return-on-investment for private sector providers, many cities especially in greater Minnesota have found it impossible to facilitate broadband access.

While the state is expected to receive funding from the federal government for broadband infrastructure deployment, federal funding alone is not sufficient in positioning the state to meet and exceed its broadband goals. The \$216 million authorized in the bill over the next biennium for the broadband grant program is necessary to ensure that the state does not miss out on the upcoming construction season while we wait for federal funds and that we are well positioned to meet our deployment goals. Additionally, the \$60 million authorization over the next biennium to extend the lower population density grant program will allow for a higher percentage of the project to be funded by the grant, which will assist more smaller and less-resourced communities with broadband deployment needs.

SF 2169 is an important step in ensuring that Minnesota continues to be a national leader in broadband deployment and resources for both the border-to-border broadband grant and lower population density grant program are crucial in providing more opportunities for broadband providers to deploy infrastructure in the cities that need it.
