

1.1 Senator moves to amend S.F. No. 676 as follows:

1.2 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.3 "ARTICLE 1

1.4 APPROPRIATIONS

1.5 Section 1. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1.6 (a) The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.7 bond proceeds fund, or another named fund, to the state agencies or officials indicated, to
1.8 be spent for public purposes. Appropriations of bond proceeds must be spent as authorized
1.9 by the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, clause (a), to acquire and better public
1.10 land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature, or as authorized by
1.11 the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, clauses (b) to (j), or article XIV. Unless
1.12 otherwise specified, money appropriated in this act:

1.13 (1) may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed directly to the capital
1.14 program or project in accordance with accounting policies adopted by the commissioner of
1.15 management and budget;

1.16 (2) is available until the project is completed or abandoned subject to Minnesota Statutes,
1.17 section 16A.642;

1.18 (3) for activities under Minnesota Statutes, sections 16B.307, 84.946, and 135A.046,
1.19 should not be used for projects that can be financed within a reasonable time frame under
1.20 Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.322 or 16C.144;

1.21 (4) is subject to the policies and procedures adopted by the commissioner of management
1.22 and budget or otherwise specified in applicable law; and

1.23 (5) is available for a grant to a political subdivision after the commissioner of management
1.24 and budget determines that an amount sufficient to complete the project as described in this
1.25 act has been committed to the project, as required by Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.502.

1.26 (b) Unless otherwise specified, appropriations in this article from the general fund are
1.27 made in fiscal year 2024 and are onetime appropriations.

6.7 bonds sold to finance HEAPR. Where a
6.8 nonstate match is required, the debt service is
6.9 due on a principal amount equal to one-third
6.10 of the total project cost, less the match
6.11 committed before the bonds are sold.

6.12 (c) The commissioner of management and
6.13 budget shall reduce the board's assessment
6.14 each year by one-third of the net income from
6.15 investment of general obligation bond
6.16 proceeds in proportion to the amount of
6.17 principal and interest otherwise required to be
6.18 paid by the board. The board shall pay its
6.19 resulting net assessment to the commissioner
6.20 of management and budget by December 1
6.21 each year. If the board fails to make a payment
6.22 when due, the commissioner of management
6.23 and budget shall reduce allotments for
6.24 appropriations from the general fund otherwise
6.25 available to the board and apply the amount
6.26 of the reduction to cover the missed debt
6.27 service payment. The commissioner of
6.28 management and budget shall credit the
6.29 payments received from the board to the bond
6.30 debt service account in the state bond fund
6.31 each December 1 before money is transferred
6.32 from the general fund under Minnesota
6.33 Statutes, section 16A.641, subdivision 10.

 7.10 senate committees with jurisdiction over
 7.11 capital investment and higher education
 7.12 finance and to the chairs of the house of
 7.13 representatives Ways and Means Committee
 7.14 and the senate Finance Committee, on how
 7.15 the remaining money has been allocated or
 7.16 spent.

 7.21 the original appropriation was made and the
 7.22 debt service requirement under this section is

 7.26 transferred.
