Problem:

The Fair Repair Act would require manufacturers to make repair manuals, tools and parts available for purchase by consumers and independent repair shops. The bill covers electronic devices such as cell phones, laptops, household appliances, farming equipment, etc.

- HF1337/SF1598 <u>does not</u> pose extraordinary danger to individuals fixing cell phones.
