#### Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



- MN's first Constitutionally dedicated funding source for the environment and natural resources
- Established in 1988


#### (77% approval)

• 40% of MN Lottery profits dedicated to it in 1990

#### (75% approval)

 Lottery contribution reaffirmed until 2025 in 1998 (74% approval)





\*\*Investment income grows the Trust Fund at an average rate of approximately 7% of its principal balance each year.



#### Minnesota Constitution Art. XI, Sec.14 Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



A permanent environment and natural resources trust fund is established in the state treasury.

Loans may be made of up to five percent of the principal of the fund for water system improvements as provided by law.

The assets of the fund shall be appropriated by law for the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's air, water, land, fish, wildlife, and other natural resources.





2022 Minnesota Statutes Chapter 116P Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



Money in the trust fund may be spent only for:

- Research
- Collection and analysis of information
- Public education
- Capital projects for protection of unique natural resources
- Activities that preserve or enhance fish, wildlife, air, water, land and other natural resources (including outdoor recreation)
- Administrative expenses (subject to limits)



2022 Minnesota Statutes Chapter 116P Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



Money from the trust fund may <u>not</u> be spent for:

- Environmental compensation, liability, and clean-up
- Municipal water pollution control for populations 5k+
- Decommissioning nuclear power plants
- Hazardous and solid waste disposal facilities
- Purposes inconsistent with the strategic plan
- Eminent domain



2022 Minnesota Statutes Chapter 116P Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



"The trust fund may not be used as a substitute for traditional sources of funding environmental and natural resources activities, but ...shall supplement the traditional sources"

#### **LCCMR Recommendations Process**



Request for Proposals	Evaluation and presentations	Scientific peer review	Final recommendations	Approval
Annual or biennial Request for Proposals	Proposals are reviewed, evaluated, ranked, and discussed	Research projects undergo scientific peer review	Top proposals recommended to legislature	Must be passed by legislature and signed by governor

After the Funds are Awarded...

- Recipients must submit a work plan
- No money can be spent unless work plan approved
- Recipients provide semiannual progress reports
- Modifications made through amendments
- The commission shall ensure that the expenditures and outcomes are met

#### Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund



Since 1991, the Trust Fund has provided ~\$875 million in support to nearly 1,800 projects benefitting every county in the state.

#### Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund Project Examples





Reducing environmental footprint through demonstration of innovative renewable energy projects

Reintroduced bison and for prairie restoration and management- Blue Mounds State park

Scientific and Natural Areas, Native Prairie Bank, State park, trails, and recreation areas, and Local Grants Program



#### Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund Project Examples





Wildlife diseases and issues: CWD, white nose syndrome (bats), fishers & bobcats, understanding moose declines, elk



Dakota Skipper butterflies (Mn Zoo), Lawns to Legumes, Minnesota Bee Survey
