
Maintaining current service levels

The cost of doing business increases over time, even when funding levels stay the same.

Minnesotans still expect MPCA to fulfill its mission to protect human health and the environment.

Maintaining current service levels continued

- Costs for labor, rent and lease, fuel and utilities,
 IT, legal services are rising.
- Continuing without adequate funding will result in:
 - Reduced capacity for water, air, land permitting, leading to backlogs.
 - Reduced ability to respond to complaints and address violations.
 - Reduced ability to investigate contaminated sites, respond to negative health impacts, and remediate contamination.
 - Reduced capacity for engaging the public and stakeholders.

General fund request for water programs

Water is essential

to Minnesota's economy and way of life.

Pollution continues to threaten our state's rivers and lakes.



General fund request for water programs continued

- Pollution poses a growing risk to water quality, requiring additional staff and complicated technologies to manage.
- 194 FTEs manage 20,000+ sites across Minnesota.
- Clean water benefits the entire population.
- For this reason, stakeholders asked MPCA to seek general fund instead of raising permit fees.

Core agency staffing

Protecting Minnesota's air, land, & water requires a core staff of employees to fulfill the agency's mission. MPCA is currently understaffed.



Core agency staffing continued

- Several MPCA programs lack resources and staffing needed to complete work obligated under federal and state law.
- Underfunding regulatory programs makes it difficult to ensure regulated parties are meeting their obligations to protect human health and the environment.
- This undermines public trust and can set us up for more costly cleanups later.


Protecting our environment and health is an integral part of a thriving economy.

PFAS: A growing challenge


PFAS chemicals have been detected all over the state, posing a risk to the health of Minnesotans.

The MPCA is tackling this problem head-on by implementing Minnesota's PFAS Blueprint to prevent, manage, and clean up PFAS across the state.



PFAS: A growing challenge continued

- New EPA standards on safe PFAS levels for drinking water are expected in the coming weeks.
- EPA is incorporating PFAS into regulatory programs ranging from Superfund to water permits.
- MPCA's PFAS Monitoring Plan evaluates
 400+ regulated sites for PFAS.
- Prevention work to eliminate PFAS at the source will greatly reduce future expensive remediation costs.

Promoting partnership

The MPCA partners with local governments and other state agencies to help regulated industries comply with laws and reduce their environmental footprint.



Promoting partnership continued

- Fostering partnerships with other state agencies and local governments helps us analyze and manage pollution.
- Counties manage regulatory compliance for more than 14,000 feedlots and 630,000 septic systems.
- Expanded biomonitoring efforts will help the MPCA and MDH identify health risks posed by air pollution.



Data


Accurate, high-quality data and efficient information management are critical for environmental reporting and decision-making.

The MPCA must modernize our data collection and reporting practices to increase transparency and better serve Minnesotans.



Data continued

- Best practices continue to evolve; MPCA's data infrastructure is dated and inefficient.
- Data backlogs lead to delayed regulatory decisions and less public accessibility.
- Investments will create agile and responsive systems that better meet the needs of businesses and the public.
- Example: Online hub for industrial stormwater permittees.
 - *Result*: Permittees receive coverage information within 24 hours.

Climate

- Every \$1 spent on climate preparedness saves Minnesota \$6 in future response costs.
- State agencies need funding to implement ambitious work outlined in Minnesota's Climate Action Framework.
- Our programs prepare communities for the impacts of climate change while reducing pollution.

Waste management

Nearly two-thirds of waste that ends up in Minnesota's landfills and waste-to-energy facilities could have been reused, recycled, or composted.

Our programs reduce waste while creating jobs and growing the economy.



Waste management continued

- Waste management continues to be a challenge for Minnesota counties.
- Over 80% of county solid waste officials in Minnesota are interested in reducing waste.
- Landfills release methane, a powerful greenhouse gas. Over time, diverting waste from landfills reduces generation of methane.
