(j) "Resident veteran" means a veteran who served in active duty in the United Statesarmed forces at any time during the eligibility period for the bonus, and who also:

(1) has been separated or discharged from the United States armed forces, and whose 11.17 home of record at the time of entry into active duty in the United States armed forces, as 11.18 indicated on the person's form DD-214 or other documents the commissioner may authorize, 11.19 is the state of Minnesota and who resides in Minnesota at the time of application with the 11.20 intention of residing in the state and not for any temporary purpose. An applicant may verify 11.21 a residence address by presenting a valid state driver's license; a state identification card; a 11.22 voter registration card; a rent receipt; a statement by the landlord, apartment manager, or 11.23 homeowner verifying that the individual is residing at the address; or other form of 11.24 verification approved by the commissioner; or 11.25

(2) is currently serving in the United States armed forces, and has a certificate from an
appropriate service authority stating that the person: (i) served in active duty in the United
States armed forces at any time during the eligibility period for the bonus; and (ii) has
Minnesota listed as the veteran's home of record in the veteran's official military personnel
file.

(k) "Service connected" means caused by an injury or disease incurred or aggravated
while on active duty, as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

(1) "Veteran" has the meaning given in section 197.447 and does not include a member
of the National Guard or the reserve components of the United States armed forces ordered
to active duty for the sole purpose of training. Veteran also includes a person who is providing
honorable service on active duty in the United States armed forces and has not been separated
or discharged.
