

1.1 **Senator Marty from the Committee on Finance, to which was re-referred**

1.2 **H.F. No. 670:** A bill for an act relating to capital investment; authorizing spending to
1.3 acquire and better land and buildings and for other improvements of a capital nature with
1.4 certain conditions; canceling prior appropriations; appropriating money; creates a grant
1.5 program; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 138.

1.6 Reports the same back with the recommendation that H.F. No. 670, the first unofficial
1.7 engrossment, be amended as follows:

1.8 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.9 **"ARTICLE 1**

1.10 **APPROPRIATIONS**

1.11 Section 1. **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.**

1.12 (a) The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.13 general fund in fiscal year 2024 to the state agencies or officials indicated, to be spent for
1.14 public purposes. These are onetime appropriations. Money appropriated in this act is available
1.15 until the project is completed or abandoned, subject to Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642.

1.16 (b) For any project funded in whole or in part by this act, workers on the project must
1.17 be paid at least the prevailing wage rate as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 177.42,
1.18 subdivision 6, and the project is subject to the requirements and enforcement provisions in
1.19 Minnesota Statutes, sections 177.27, 177.30, 177.32, and 177.41 to 177.45. For the purposes
1.20 of this act, "project" means demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of
1.21 a public building, facility, or other public work financed in whole or part by state funds.
1.22 Project also includes demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of a
1.23 building, facility, or public work when the acquisition of property, predesign, design, or
1.24 demolition is financed in whole or in part by state funds.

1.25 (c) Money appropriated in this act: (1) is available for a grant after the commissioner of
1.26 management and budget determines that an amount sufficient to complete the project as
1.27 described in this act has been committed to the project, as required by Minnesota Statutes,
1.28 section 16A.502; and (2) may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed
1.29 directly to the capital program or project for capitalizable staff costs.

1.30 (d) The sustainable building guidelines under Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.325, are
1.31 mandatory for all new buildings and major renovations owned or to be owned by the state,
1.32 state agencies, Minnesota State Colleges and Universities, and the University of Minnesota
1.33 that are funded with an appropriation in this act.

 4.33 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.12, unless
 4.34 this section or the statutes referred to in this

5.1 section provide more specific standards,
 5.2 criteria, or priorities for projects than
 5.3 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.12.

5.4 **Subd. 2. Natural Resources Asset Preservation** **31,652,000**

5.5 For the preservation and replacement of
 5.6 state-owned facilities and recreational assets
 5.7 operated by the commissioner of natural
 5.8 resources to be spent in accordance with
 5.9 Minnesota Statutes, section 84.946.
 5.10 Notwithstanding the specified uses of money
 5.11 under Minnesota Statutes, section 84.946, the
 5.12 commissioner may use this appropriation for
 5.13 capital expenditures allowed under Minnesota
 5.14 Statutes, section 84.946, that do not constitute
 5.15 betterments and capital improvements within

7.12 103F.161. To the extent practical, levee
7.13 projects shall meet the state standard of three
7.14 feet above the 100-year flood elevation.

7.15 (b) Project priorities shall be determined by
7.16 the commissioner as appropriate, based on
7.17 need and consideration of available leveraging
7.18 of federal, state, and local funds.

7.19 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), \$3,300,000
7.20 is for phase II of the Toelle Coulee project in
7.21 Traverse County to mitigate flood risks posed
7.22 to the city of Browns Valley, including
7.23 construction of an East Levee, County
7.24 State-Aid Highway 2 culvert replacement, and
7.25 marked Trunk Highway 28 culvert

9.4 (b) Upon substantial completion of the project
 9.5 authorized in this subdivision and after written
 9.6 notice to the commissioner of management
 9.7 and budget, the commissioner of natural
 9.8 resources may use any money remaining in
 9.9 this appropriation to design, engineer, and
 9.10 construct publicly owned water mitigation
 9.11 infrastructure at the Hill annex open pit mining


