1.2 follows:

1.3 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.4 "ARTICLE 1

1.5 APPROPRIATIONS

1.6 Section 1. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.

1.7 (a) The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.8 general fund in fiscal year 2024 to the state agencies or officials indicated, to be spent for
1.9 public purposes. These are onetime appropriations. Money appropriated in this act is available
1.10 until the project is completed or abandoned, subject to Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642.

1.11 (b) For any project funded in whole or in part by this act, workers on the project must
1.12 be paid at least the prevailing wage rate as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 177.42,
1.13 subdivision 6, and the project is subject to the requirements and enforcement provisions in
1.14 Minnesota Statutes, sections 177.27, 177.30, 177.32, and 177.41 to 177.45. For the purposes
1.15 of this act, "project" means demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of
1.16 a public building, facility, or other public work financed in whole or part by state funds.
1.17 Project also includes demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of a
1.18 building, facility, or public work when the acquisition of property, predesign, design, or
1.19 demolition is financed in whole or in part by state funds.

1.20 (c) Money appropriated in this act: (1) is available for a grant after the commissioner of
1.21 management and budget determines that an amount sufficient to complete the project as
1.22 described in this act has been committed to the project, as required by Minnesota Statutes,
1.23 section 16A.502; and (2) may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed
1.24 directly to the capital program or project for capitalizable staff costs.

1.25 (d) The sustainable building guidelines under Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.325, are
1.26 mandatory for all new buildings and major renovations owned or to be owned by the state,
1.27 state agencies, Minnesota State Colleges and Universities, and the University of Minnesota
1.28 that are funded with an appropriation in this act.

6.12 **Subd. 5. Wildfire Aviation Infrastructure** 6,360,000

6.13 For site preparation, predesign, design,
 6.14 engineering, demolition, construction,
 6.15 furnishing, and equipping new public safety
 6.16 facilities for aerial wildfire suppression, which
 6.17 may include grants to airport authorities. This
 6.18 appropriation includes money for the Hibbing
 6.19 airport and air tanker base buildings and
 6.20 associated utilities and systems.

6.21 **Subd. 6. Accessibility** 1,000,000

6.22 For the design and construction of accessibility
 6.23 improvements at state parks, recreation areas,
 6.24 and wildlife management areas.

6.25 **Subd. 7. Dam Renovation, Repair, Removal** 4,000,000

6.26 (a) For design, engineering, and construction
 6.27 to repair, reconstruct, or remove publicly
 6.28 owned dams and respond to dam safety
 6.29 emergencies on publicly owned dams. The
 6.30 commissioner shall determine project priorities
 6.31 as appropriate under Minnesota Statutes,
 6.32 sections 103G.511 and 103G.515.

6.33 (b) If the commissioner determines that a
 6.34 project is not ready to proceed, this

7.1 appropriation may be used for other projects
 7.2 on the commissioner's priority list.

7.3 **Subd. 8. Flood Hazard Mitigation** 25,300,000

7.4 (a) For the state share of flood hazard
 7.5 mitigation grants for publicly owned capital
 7.6 improvements to prevent or alleviate flood
 7.7 damage under Minnesota Statutes, section
 7.8 103F.161. To the extent practical, levee
 7.9 projects shall meet the state standard of three
 7.10 feet above the 100-year flood elevation.

7.11 (b) Project priorities shall be determined by
 7.12 the commissioner as appropriate, based on
 7.13 need and consideration of available leveraging
 7.14 of federal, state, and local funds.

7.15 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), \$3,300,000
 7.16 is for phase II of the Toelle Coulee project in
 7.17 Traverse County to mitigate flood risks posed
 7.18 to the city of Browns Valley, including
 7.19 construction of an East Levee, County
 7.20 State-Aid Highway 2 culvert replacement, and

7.23 (d) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), \$6,000,000
 7.24 is for a grant to the city of Carver for capital

 7.26 protecting an important historic district in
 7.27 Minnesota from flood waters of the Minnesota
 7.28 River. This levee restoration must meet the
 7.29 requirements for FEMA certification. The
 7.30 project includes predesign, design,
 7.31 engineering, land acquisition, and construction
 7.32 of capital improvements, including raising the
 7.33 height of the Carver levee, constructing
 7.34 internal drainage, establishing maintainable

8.3 (e) Notwithstanding paragraph (b),
