## Statewide: ~980,000 5 to 17 Year Olds

Minnesota's School-Age Population, 2021

Number of births remains down by about 9,000 compared to the height in 2007

## Birth rates have been falling slowly for the last 15 years

## For 80\% of Minnesota school children all parents in the household are in the labor force

## 2021: 272,000 (28\%) Minnesota school-age children live in low-income families

Poverty Status of Children Ages 5-17


In 2021:

- Federal Poverty Level for a family of 4: \$27,479
- 200\% the Federal Poverty Level for a Family of 4 (LowIncome): \$54,958
- 110,000 School-Age Children Lived in Poverty (11\%)
- An additional 161,000 lived in families with low incomes (17\%)


## Slightly lower percentage of school-age children live in low-income families, compared to a decade ago
