\$400,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$400,000 in fiscal year 2025 are appropriated from the
general fund to the commissioner of veterans affairs for a grant to the veterans resilience
project. Grant funds must be used to make eye movement desensitization and reprocessing
therapy available to veterans, veterans' spouses, current military service members, and
current military service members' spouses who are suffering from posttraumatic stress
disorder and trauma. This appropriation is added to the base.
