


Used cars have become unaffordable

Used-Car Prices Are Falling, but Buying Is Still a Challenge

As prices ease from all-time highs, higher interest rates are ramping up monthly payments

Average car payments in the U.S. increased year-over-year by double-digit percentages.

- 13.3% for new vehicles.
- 11.2% for used vehicles

Average monthly car payments at \$700 & \$525, respectively.

(No gas, no insurance, no maintenance.

Can't spend \$6,000 - \$10,000 a year? Have better uses for that money? Do Minnesotans have options?

In the metro region



Since 2016: GreaterMSP's critical transportation indicator has fallen from 6.0% to 4.9%.

In Greater Minnesota

"MnDOT projects that transit need will grow from approximately 15 million to 20 million passenger trips per year between 2021 and 2030. To meet this need, Greater Minnesota public transit systems <u>would need to provide</u> approximately 2 million hours of service hours of service in 2030."

Table 7: Projected Operating & Capital Needs vs. Projected Revenues for Greater Minnesota Transit: 2021 to 2026



Unfunded need: \$349.8 million
