1.7	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have
1.8	the meanings given.
1.9	(b) "Integrated roadside vegetation management" means an approach to right-of-way
1.10	maintenance that combines a variety of techniques with sound ecological principles to
1.11	establish and maintain safe, healthy, and functional roadsides. Integrated roadside vegetation
1.12	management includes but is not limited to judicious use of herbicides, spot mowing,
1.13	biological control, prescribed burning, mechanical tree and brush removal, erosion prevention
1.14	and treatment, and prevention and treatment of other right-of-way disturbances.
1.15	(c) "Program" means the highways for habitat program established in this section.
1.16	Subd. 2. Program establishment. The commissioner must establish a highways for
1.17	habitat program to enhance roadsides with pollinator and other wildlife habitat and vegetative
1.18	buffers.
1.19	Subd. 3. General requirements. In implementing the program, the commissioner must:
