1.9	Section 1. [119B.252] EARLY CHILDHOOD APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM.
1.10	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The commissioner of human services shall establish an
1.11	apprenticeship program to provide paid opportunities for early childhood workers to learn
1.12	from and consult with professionals in the early childhood field.
1.13	Subd. 2. Definitions. (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have the
1.14	definitions given.
1.15	(b) "Early childhood program" means a licensed child care center, a licensed family or
1.16	group family child care home, a public prekindergarten program, or a certified,
1.17	license-exempt child care center.
1.18	(c) "Mentor" means an individual currently employed for a minimum of 30 hours a week
1.19	in an early childhood program who meets the qualifications of teacher under Minnesota

3.1	Sec. 2. <u>RECOGNIZING COMPARABLE COMPETENCIES TO ACHIEVE</u>
3.2	COMPARABLE COMPENSATION TASK FORCE.
3.3	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The Recognizing Comparable Competencies to Achieve
3.4	Comparable Compensation Task Force is established to develop methods for incorporating
3.5	competencies and experiences, as well as educational attainment, into a compensation model
3.6	for the early childhood workforce.
3.7	Subd. 2. Membership. (a) The task force shall consist of the following members,
3.8	appointed by the governor:
3.9	(1) two individuals who are directors of a licensed child care center, one from greater
3.10	Minnesota and one from the seven-county metropolitan area;
3.11	(2) two individuals who are license holders of family child care programs, one from
3.12	greater Minnesota and one from the seven-county metropolitan area;
3.13	(3) three individuals who are early childhood educators, one who works in a licensed
3.14	child care center, one who works in a public-school-based early childhood program, and
3.15	one who works in a Head Start program or a community education program;
3.16	(4) one representative of a federally recognized Tribe who has expertise in the early care
3.17	and education system;
3.18	(5) one representative from the Children's Cabinet;
3.19	(6) two parents of children under five years of age, one parent whose child attends a
3.20	private early care and education program and one parent whose child attends a public
3.21	program. One parent under this clause must be from greater Minnesota, and the other parent
3.22	must be from the seven-county metropolitan area; and
3.23	(7) four individuals who have expertise in early childhood workforce issues.
3.24	(b) The governor must select a chair or cochairs for the task force from among the
3.25	members. The first task force meeting must be convened by the chair or cochairs and held
3.26	no later than September 1, 2023. Thereafter, the chair or cochairs shall convene the task
3.27	force at least monthly and may convene other meetings as necessary. The chair or cochairs
3.28	shall convene meetings in a manner to allow for access from diverse geographic locations
3.29	in Minnesota.

3.30 (c) Compensation of task force members, filling of task force vacancies, and removal 3.31 of task force members are governed by Minnesota Statutes, section 15.059.

5.24 Sec. 6. APPROPRIATION; WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARSHIPS.

5.25 \$500,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$500,000 in fiscal year 2025 are appropriated from the

5.26 general fund to the Board of Trustees of the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities for

5.27 workforce development scholarships under Minnesota Statutes, section 136F.38. The amounts

- 5.28 appropriated in this section must be dedicated exclusively to students enrolled in early
- 5.29 childhood programs and are in addition to any amounts directed to students enrolled in early
- 5.30 childhood programs from other appropriations for the workforce development scholarship
- 5.31 program.
