



Share of MPCC First-year Students and MN High School Grads who are Students of Color and Native American Students





# Affordability

The average net tuition that first-time students pay at our member institutions is \$900 less than it was 10 years ago.



#### Declining Access to Higher Ed

- Enrollment of Pell Grant recipients at Minnesota colleges and universities has fallen at two-times the rate of non-Pell Grant recipients.
- Worrying declines in college enrollment for recent MN high school graduates between 2019 and 2021:

Black HS grads: 13 pct. pt. drop

Latino HS grads: 11 pct. pt. drop

Native American HS grads: 10 pct. pt. drop

# State Grant Impact and Value

- Helps low- and middle-income families
- Increases enrollment and graduation rates
- Narrows gaps in college enrollment and completion for students of color and Native American students and lowincome students
- Encourages students to stay in Minnesota
- Holds down additional borrowing
- Supports all college options

# Who Benefits from the State Grant Program

- 39% of Minnesota undergraduates receive a State Grant
- 54% of Minnesota students of color & Native American students receive a State Grant
- 62% of funds go to students attending public institutions Community and Technical Colleges, State Universities, and the University of Minnesota
- 67% of State Grant recipients have family incomes lower than \$50,000

# State Grant Request

#### Increase State Grants by Lowering the Student Share

- The State Grant program expects students to pay too much 50% of cost of attendance.
- It is not possible for students to cover half of their college costs through reasonable work and borrowing.
- Request: Lower the student share to the affordability benchmark of 36%.
- Reducing the student share to 36% would:
  - increase the average State Grant by \$2,000.
  - Increase the number of State Grant recipients by about 10% (6,300 new recipients)



#### St. Scholastica Mission

- Grounded in the Catholic intellectual tradition and shaped by the Benedictine heritage, the College stresses "intellectual and moral preparation for responsible living and meaningful work"
- Founded in 1912 in Duluth
- Online programs and hybrid programs offered in Austin, Cloquet, Grand Rapids, Inver Grove Heights & St. Cloud







#### St. Scholastica Today

- 3,207 students; 79% from Minnesota
- 1,938 traditional and non-traditional undergraduates (1/3 receive State Grants)
- 19% of students from diverse backgrounds
- 27% First Generation Students
- 100% of CSS undergraduates receive financial assistance
- 28% of undergraduates have family incomes less than \$50,000





#### **Serving Our Veterans**

- Top-ranked as a military-friendly college
- Yellow Ribbon campus
- Partner with the 148th Fighter Wing on trauma training and mentoring
- Nursing major offers Veteran cohort experiences and recognizes leadership experiences

#### **Preparing Minnesota's Workforce**

- A liberal arts and sciences foundation is the underpinning for all 40+ majors at CSS
- Largest private School of Nursing in Minnesota
- Other health professions programs include: Health Information Management, Health Informatics, Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Physician Assistant, and Social Work
- All CSS nursing and health professions programs focus on preparing students for work in rural and/or underserved communities
- CSS community clinic offers OT and PT to uninsured/underinsured adults and children
- 98% of alumni survey respondents are employed or in graduate school within 6 months of graduation--the majority in healthcare and other professional fields





#### **Contributions to the Region**

- 500 employees and a \$220 million impact on the regional economy
- Strong community partnerships in healthcare, business, and education
- More than 8,000 nursing alumni, including BS, post-baccalaureate, RNBS and DNP graduates
- 60% of all CSS students major in nursing or other health professions
- CSS students, faculty, and staff volunteer actively in the community





#### **Impact of the Minnesota State Grant**

- Over 600 undergraduates at CSS receive Minnesota State Grant funding
- The Minnesota State Grant helps low and middle-income families at private and public colleges throughout the state
- Great investment in future workforce: 72% of CSS alumni live & work in Minnesota
- The pandemic has affected many students' families financially and has also reduced availability of student jobs and internships
