AFFORDABILITY



Minnesota State Grant Simplification and Federal Conformity \$18.7M

In 2020, Congress passed the FAFSA Simplification Act, which makes several signification to the FAFSA form and to Pell eligibility criteria. These changes will be rolled out in approach, starting with the 21-22 award year and continuing through the 24-25 award year.

A significant amount of work is needed to ensure financial aid in Minnesota aligns vechanges.

Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governor Flanagan propose funding to the State Grain order to conform with changes to the federal needs-analysis and Pell Grant calcuscheduled to be implemented for the 2024-25 aid year.

Minnesota State Grant: Living and Miscellaneous \$50M

This investment will align the State's support of Minnesota Tribal College with its suppublic colleges by:

Nursing Assistants are currently the sixth most high-need career in Minnesota. This p provides free training, and covers the cost of books, uniform, and certification exam.

Since launching in January 2022, this initiative has provided **2,306 Minnesotans** with double Governor Walz's original goal of 1,000. In addition, more than 34 school districted grants to purchase lab equipment and materials necessary for offering nursi training in their high school.

Now, Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governor Flanagan propose ongoing funding. Th will provide steady jobs, bolster the health care workforce pipeline, and support the force of our state.

Emergency Assistance for Postsecondary Student \$4.4M

The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has drastically impacted the enrollment and su income college students. In a recent survey of 43,000 college students across the cou

- 36% of students reported experiencing food insecurity within the 30 days preceding
- 36% of all respondents experienced housing insecurity within the last year, and
- 9% experienced homeless within the last year

Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governor Flanagan propose investing in the State's EA to increase the number of students receiving emergency grants, by:

- Increasing the maximum institution grant request cap from \$43,000 to \$60,000
- Increasing the maximum individual student grant request cap from \$1,000 to \$1,

Student Parent Support Initiative \$13.4M

Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governor Flanagan propose establishing a competitive program for higher education institutions and partnering organizations to assist pare children and expectant parents by offering services that support their academic goals well-being. Funds will be used for efforts such as:

- Staff and student workers
- Food, housing, energy assistance grants
- Workshops, continuing education
- Supplies
- Expenses related to child care (whether on campus or other)
- Evaluation for the work

Underrepresented Student Teacher Grants \$1.6M

Data suggests that when there are teachers of color and American Indian teachers so Minnesota's teacher workforce, it has a positive impact on the success of all student Minnesota, and particularly on the success of students of color and American Indian Underrepresented Student Teacher Grant (USTG) plays an important role in recruiting color and American Indian teachers.

Current funding for USTG does not meet the need, nor does it allow us to provide the (\$7,500) to those awarded a grant. Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governor Flanagan propose expanding the grant, whi allow OHE to support more teachers working in greater Minnesota.

Teacher Shortage Loan Repayment Program \$1.6M

There is a teacher staffing shortage facing Minnesota schools. The Teacher Shorta Repayment (TSLR) Program is another tool for addressing this staffing crisis and reinto the education workforce.

The TSLR Program provides student loan debt relief, in the form of repayment aw eligible teachers for up to \$1,000. Eligible teachers may receive up to 5 annual aw of up to \$5,000.

Current funding does not meet demand, and Governor Walz and Lieutenant Governance Flanagan's proposal would allow OHE to support more teachers.

Sustaining and Expanding Intervention for College Attendance Program \$800K
