1.3 **S.F. No. 1298:** A bill for an act relating to housing; amending provisions related to
1.4 residential housing evictions; amending summons and complaint provisions related to

1.6 subdivision 4; 504B.285, subdivision 5; 504B.291, subdivision 1; 504B.321; 504B.331;
1.7 504B.335; 504B.345, subdivision 1, by adding a subdivision; 504B.361, subdivision 1;
1.8 504B.365, subdivision 1; 504B.371, subdivisions 3, 4, 5, 7; repealing Minnesota Statutes
1.9 2022, section 504B.341.

1.10 Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

1.11 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.12 "Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 363A.03, is amended by adding a subdivision
1.13 to read:

1.14 Subd. 20a. **Housing assistance program.** "Housing assistance program" means a program
1.15 that provides federal, state, or local housing assistance including but not limited to rental
1.16 assistance, rent supplements, and housing choice vouchers.

1.17 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 363A.09, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

1.18 Subdivision 1. **Real property interest; action by owner, lessee, and others.** It is an
1.19 unfair discriminatory practice for an owner, lessee, sublessee, assignee, or managing agent
1.20 of, or other person having the right to sell, rent or lease any real property, or any agent of
1.21 any of these:

1.22 (1) to refuse to sell, rent, or lease or otherwise deny to or withhold from any person or
1.23 group of persons any real property because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin,
1.24 sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, participation in or requirements
1.25 of a housing assistance program, disability, sexual orientation, or familial status; or

1.26 (2) to discriminate against any person or group of persons because of race, color, creed,
1.27 religion, national origin, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance,
1.28 participation in or requirements of a housing assistance program, disability, sexual orientation,
1.29 or familial status in the terms, conditions or privileges of the sale, rental or lease of any real
1.30 property or in the furnishing of facilities or services in connection therewith, except that
1.31 nothing in this clause shall be construed to prohibit the adoption of reasonable rules intended
1.32 to protect the safety of minors in their use of the real property or any facilities or services

2.13 discriminatory practice for a real estate broker, real estate salesperson, or employee, or agent
2.14 thereof:

2.15 (1) to refuse to sell, rent, or lease or to offer for sale, rental, or lease any real property
2.16 to any person or group of persons or to negotiate for the sale, rental, or lease of any real
2.17 property to any person or group of persons because of race, color, creed, religion, national
2.18 origin, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, participation in or
2.19 requirements of a housing assistance program, disability, sexual orientation, or familial
2.20 status or represent that real property is not available for inspection, sale, rental, or lease
2.21 when in fact it is so available, or otherwise deny or withhold any real property or any
2.22 facilities of real property to or from any person or group of persons because of race, color,
2.23 creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, status with regard to public assistance,
2.24 participation in or requirements of a housing assistance program, disability, sexual orientation,
2.25 or familial status; or

2.26 (2) to discriminate against any person because of race, color, creed, religion, national

3.9 Subdivision 1. **Housing.** The provisions of section 363A.09 shall not apply to:

3.10 (1) rooms in a temporary or permanent residence home run by a nonprofit organization,
3.11 if the discrimination is by sex;

3.12 (2) the rental by a resident owner or occupier of a one-family accommodation of a room
3.13 or rooms in the accommodation to another person or persons if the discrimination is by sex,
3.14 marital status, status with regard to public assistance, participation in or requirements of a
3.15 housing assistance program, sexual orientation, or disability. Except as provided elsewhere
3.16 in this chapter or other state or federal law, no person or group of persons selling, renting,

3.29 ~~that the plaintiff's case is sufficiently without basis in fact or law, which may include lack~~
3.30 ~~of jurisdiction over the case, that~~ if the court makes the following findings:

4.24 Sec. 7. **[504B.114] PET DECLAWING AND DEVOCALIZATION PROHIBITED.**

4.25 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have
 4.26 the meanings given.

4.27 (b) "Animal" has the meaning given in section 343.20, subdivision 2.

4.28 (c) "Application for occupancy" means all phases of the process of applying for the right
 4.29 to occupy a real property, including but not limited to filling out applications, interviewing,
 4.30 and submitting references.

5.1 (d) "Claw" means a hardened keratinized modification of the epidermis or a hardened
5.2 keratinized growth that extends from the end of the digits of certain mammals, birds, reptiles,
5.3 and amphibians that is commonly referred to as a claw, talon, or nail.

5.4 (e) "Declawing" means performing, procuring, or arranging for any procedure, such as
5.5 an onychectomy, tendonectomy, or phalangectomy, to remove or prevent the normal function
5.6 of an animal's claw or claws.

5.7 (f) "Devocalizing" means performing, procuring, or arranging for any surgical procedure,
5.8 such as a vocal cordectomy, to remove an animal's vocal cords or to prevent the normal
5.9 function of an animal's vocal cords.

5.10 Subd. 2. **Prohibitions.** A landlord who allows an animal on the premises shall not:

5.11 (1) advertise the availability of a real property for occupancy in a manner designed to
5.12 discourage application for occupancy of that real property because an applicant's animal
5.13 has not been declawed or devocalized;

5.14 (2) refuse to allow the occupancy of a real property, refuse to negotiate the occupancy
5.15 of a real property, or otherwise make unavailable or deny to another person the occupancy
5.16 of a real property because of that person's refusal to declaw or devocalize an animal; or

5.17 (3) require a tenant or occupant of real property to declaw or devocalize an animal
5.18 allowed on the premises.

5.19 Subd. 3. **Penalties.** (a) A city attorney, a county attorney, or the attorney general may
5.20 bring an action in district court to obtain injunctive relief for a violation of this section and
5.21 to enforce the civil penalties provided in this subdivision.

5.22 (b) In addition to any other penalty allowed by law, a violation of subdivision 2, clause
5.23 (1), shall result in a civil penalty of not more than \$1,000 per advertisement, to be paid to
5.24 the entity that is authorized to bring the action under this section.

5.25 (c) In addition to any other penalty allowed by law, a violation of subdivision 2, clause
5.26 (2) or (3), shall result in a civil penalty of not more than \$1,000 per animal, to be paid to
5.27 the entity that is authorized to bring the action under this section.

6.2 Subdivision 1. **Prohibited fees.** Except for actual services rendered for an optional
6.3 service offered by the landlord, a landlord shall not charge a tenant any nonrefundable fee
6.4 in relation to a residential tenancy.

6.5 Subd. 2. **Penalties.** A landlord who violates this section is liable to the residential tenant
6.6 for each unenforceable fee for three times the amount of each fee imposed, and the court
6.7 may award the tenant reasonable attorney's fees.

6.8 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2023, and applies to leases
6.9 entered into or renewed on or after that date.

6.10 Sec. 9. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 504B.135, is amended to read:

6.11 **504B.135 TERMINATING TENANCY AT WILL.**

6.12 ~~(a)~~ A tenancy at will may be terminated by either party by giving notice in writing. The
6.13 time of the notice must be at least as long as the interval between the time rent is due or
6.14 three months, whichever is less.

6.15 ~~(b) If a tenant neglects or refuses to pay rent due on a tenancy at will, the landlord may~~
6.16 ~~terminate the tenancy by giving the tenant 14 days notice to quit in writing.~~

6.19 When a landlord and a tenant sign a residential lease for a term that is at least ten months,
6.20 the landlord must not require the tenant to renew the lease until at least four months have
6.21 passed since the tenant occupied the unit. Any provision, whether oral or written, of any
6.22 lease or other agreement, whereby any provision of this section is waived by a tenant, is
6.23 contrary to public policy and void.

6.26 Sec. 11. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 504B.161, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

 7.12 caused by the willful, malicious, or irresponsible conduct of the tenant or licensee or a
 7.13 person under the direction or control of the tenant or licensee; and

7.14 (5) to supply or furnish heat at a minimum temperature of at least 68 degrees Fahrenheit,
 7.15 measured at a distance of 36 inches above floor level, and not closer than 36 inches from
 7.16 an interior wall of a residential unit, from October 1 through April 30.

7.17 (b) The parties to a lease or license of residential premises may not waive or modify the
 7.18 covenants imposed by this section.

7.19 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2023.

7.20 Sec. 12. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 504B.171, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

7.21 Subdivision 1. **Terms of covenant.** (a) In every lease or license of residential premises,
 7.22 whether in writing or parol, the landlord or licensor and the tenant or licensee covenant that:

7.23 (1) neither will:

7.24 (i) unlawfully allow controlled substances in those premises or in the common area and
 7.25 curtilage of the premises in violation of any criminal provision of chapter 152;

7.26 (ii) allow prostitution or prostitution-related activity as defined in section 617.80,
 7.27 subdivision 4, to occur on the premises or in the common area and curtilage of the premises;

8.13 authorized occupant.

8.14 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2023.

8.15 Sec. 13. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 504B.171, is amended by adding a subdivision
8.16 to read:

8.17 **Subd. 2a. Limitation on crime free lease provisions.** A residential landlord may not
8.18 impose a penalty on a residential tenant or terminate the lease of a residential tenant for the
8.19 conduct of the residential tenant, household member, or guest occurring off of the premises
8.20 or the common area and curtilage of the premises, unless the conduct would constitute a
8.21 violent crime against another tenant, regardless of whether a charge was brought or a
8.22 conviction obtained.

8.27 directly, or through additional rent, may recover attorney fees in an action between the
8.28 landlord and tenant, the tenant is entitled to attorney fees if the tenant prevails in the same
8.29 type of action, under the same circumstances, or is entitled to costs under section 549.02,
8.30 and to the same extent as specified in the lease for the landlord.

9.18 Subdivision 1. **Initial inspection.** At the commencement of a residential tenancy, or
 9.19 within 14 days of a residential tenant occupying a unit, the landlord must notify the tenant
 9.20 of their option to request an initial inspection of the residential unit for the purposes of
 9.21 identifying existing deficiencies in the rental unit to avoid deductions for the security deposit
 9.22 of the tenant at a future date. If the tenant requests an inspection, the landlord and tenant
 9.23 shall schedule the inspection at a mutually acceptable date and time.

9.24 Subd. 2. **Move-out inspection.** Within a reasonable time after notification of either a
 9.25 landlord or residential tenant's intention to terminate the tenancy, or before the end of the
 9.26 lease term, the landlord shall notify the tenant in writing of the tenant's option to request an
 9.27 initial inspection and of the tenant's right to be present at the inspection. At a reasonable
 9.28 time, but no earlier than five days before the termination or the end of the lease date, or day
 9.29 the tenant plans to vacate the unit, the landlord, or an agent of the landlord, shall, upon the
 9.30 request of the tenant, make a move-out inspection of the premises. The purpose of the
 9.31 move-out inspection shall be to allow the tenant an opportunity to remedy identified
 9.32 deficiencies, in a manner consistent with the rights and obligations of the parties under the

10.1 rental agreement, in order to avoid deductions from the security deposit. If a tenant chooses
 10.2 not to request an initial inspection, the duties of the landlord under this subdivision are
 10.3 discharged. If an inspection is requested, the parties shall attempt to schedule the inspection

10.5 Subd. 3. **Other requirements under law.** Nothing in this section changes the
 10.6 requirements or obligations under any other section of law, including but not limited to

10.8 Subd. 4. **Waiver.** Any provision, whether oral or written, of any lease or other agreement,

10.11 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective August 1, 2023, and applies to leases
 10.12 entered into or renewed on or after that date.

10.13 Sec. 17. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 504B.211, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

10.14 Subd. 2. **Entry by landlord.** Except as provided in subdivision 4, a landlord may enter
 10.15 the premises rented by a residential tenant only for a reasonable business purpose and after
 10.16 making a good faith effort to give the residential tenant reasonable notice under the
 10.17 circumstances of not less than 24 hours in advance of the intent to enter. A residential tenant
 10.18 may permit a landlord to enter the rented premises with less than 24 hours notice if desired.
 10.19 The notice must specify a time or anticipated time of entry and the landlord may only enter

11.5 **LEASE EVICTION ACTIONS.**

11.6 Subdivision 1. **Right to counsel.** A defendant in public housing subject to an eviction
11.7 action under sections 504B.281 to 504B.371 alleging breach of lease under section 504B.171
11.8 or 504B.285 who is financially unable to obtain counsel has the right to counsel appointed
11.9 by the court. The complaint required by section 504B.321 shall include the notice on the
11.10 first page of the complaint in bold 12-point type: "If financially unable to obtain counsel,
11.11 the defendant has the right to a court-appointed attorney." At the initial hearing, the court
11.12 shall ask the defendant if the defendant wants court-appointed counsel and shall explain
11.13 what such appointed counsel can accomplish for the defendant.

11.14 Subd. 2. **Qualifications.** Counsel appointed by the court must (1) have a minimum of
