RE: Support for SF1028, Written Testimony

As the mother of two school-age children and a registered, licensed occupational therapist who works as the coordinator for third-party reimbursement at the Minneapolis Public Schools, I know firsthand that passage of SF1028 is a win for Minnesota children, families, schools, and the State of Minnesota.

SF1028 is a win for Minnesota children:

- Minnesota children are in urgent need of mental health services (1).
- Schools aim to *prevent* serious mental health diagnoses by providing services relevant to children's needs, development, and learning abilities.
- SF1028 will bolster mental health services that are already being provided *year-round* to children of all ages in schools who have eligible needs (2, 3).

SF1028 is a win for Minnesota families:

- Special education services are carved out of Medicaid; there is *no cost* to families. Medicaid reimbursement for school-based services does not affect public or private coverage, TEFRA, waivered programs, limits, or thresholds (4).
- Families can access qualified mental health providers, both in schools and the community, because all mental
 health providers in Minnesota have the same education, training, certification, and licensing requirements (5).

SF1028 is a win for Minnesota schools:

- SF1028 will allow schools to access federal Medicaid funds for special education mental health services rather than drawing down their educational funds and increasing cross-subsidy (6).
- Federal Medicaid is the path for sustainable funding to build up and provide ongoing mental health services for children in Minnesota schools.

SF1028 is a win for the State of Minnesota:

- There is **no cost** to the state; schools are reimbursed with federal Medicaid funds (7).
- The Bipartisan Safer Communities Act expands vital mental health services and provides federal support for states and districts (8).

Therefore, I urge the committee to pass SF1028 and thank you for taking time to review this testimony.
