## 2.2 609.1055 OFFENDERS WITH SERIOUS AND PERSISTENT MENTAL ILLNESS; 2.3 ALTERNATIVE PLACEMENT.

When a court intends to commit an offender with a serious and persistent mental illness, 2.4 as defined in section 245.462, subdivision 20, paragraph (c), to the custody of the 2.5 commissioner of corrections for imprisonment at a state correctional facility, either when 2.6 initially pronouncing a sentence or when revoking an offender's probation, the court, when 2.7 consistent with public safety, may instead place the offender on probation or continue the 2.8 offender's probation and require as a condition of the probation that the offender successfully 2.9 complete an appropriate supervised alternative living program having a mental health 2.10 treatment component. This section applies only to offenders who would have a remaining 2.11 term of imprisonment after adjusting for credit for prior imprisonment, if any, of more than 2.12 one year or more. 2.13
