

1.1 **Senator Latz from the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety, to which was**  
1.2 **referred**

1.3 **S.F. No. 1886:** A bill for an act relating to human rights; removing certain sections in  
1.4 the human rights act that allow for discrimination based on sexual orientation; amending  
1.5 Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 363A.03, subdivision 44, by adding a subdivision;  
1.6 363A.21, subdivision 1; repealing Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 363A.20, subdivision  
1.7 3; 363A.27.

1.8 Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

1.9 Page 1, after line 7 insert:

1.10 "Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 363A.02, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

1.11 Subdivision 1. **Freedom from discrimination.** (a) It is the public policy of this state to  
1.12 secure for persons in this state, freedom from discrimination:

1.13 (1) in employment because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital  
1.14 status, disability, status with regard to public assistance, gender identity, sexual orientation,  
1.15 familial status, and age;

1.16 (2) in housing and real property because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin,  
1.17 sex, marital status, disability, status with regard to public assistance, gender identity, sexual  
1.18 orientation, and familial status;

1.19 (3) in public accommodations because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin,  
1.20 sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, and disability;

1.21 (4) in public services because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital  
1.22 status, disability, gender identity, sexual orientation, and status with regard to public  
1.23 assistance; and

1.24 (5) in education because of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, marital status,  
1.25 disability, status with regard to public assistance, gender identity, sexual orientation, and  
1.26 age.

1.27 (b) Such discrimination threatens the rights and privileges of the inhabitants of this state  
1.28 and menaces the institutions and foundations of democracy. It is also the public policy of  
1.29 this state to protect all persons from wholly unfounded charges of discrimination. Nothing  
1.30 in this chapter shall be interpreted as restricting the implementation of positive action  
1.31 programs to combat discrimination.

2.2 Subd. 23. **Local commission.** "Local commission" means an agency of a city, county,  
2.3 or group of counties created pursuant to law, resolution of a county board, city charter, or

2.5 color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, disability, marital status, status with regard  
2.6 to public assistance, gender identity, sexual orientation, or familial status."

2.7 Page 1, after line 20, insert:

2.8 "Sec. 5. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 363A.04, is amended to read:

2.9 **363A.04 CONSTRUCTION AND EXCLUSIVITY.**

2.10 The provisions of this chapter shall be construed liberally for the accomplishment of the  
2.11 purposes thereof. Nothing contained in this chapter shall be deemed to repeal any of the  
2.12 provisions of the civil rights law or of any other law of this state relating to discrimination  
2.13 because of race, creed, color, religion, sex, age, disability, marital status, status with regard  
2.14 to public assistance, national origin, gender identity, sexual orientation, or familial status;  
2.15 but, as to acts declared unfair by sections 363A.08 to 363A.19, and 363A.28, subdivision  
2.16 10, the procedure herein provided shall, while pending, be exclusive.

2.21 rights policies and programs, and make recommendations to the governor and the legislature  
2.22 for their consideration and implementation;

3.13 programs the commissioner deems necessary;

3.14 (12) make a written report of the activities of the commissioner to the governor each  
3.15 year;

3.16 (13) accept gifts, bequests, grants, or other payments public and private to help finance  
3.17 the activities of the department;

3.18 (14) create such local and statewide advisory committees as will in the commissioner's  
3.19 judgment aid in effectuating the purposes of the Department of Human Rights;

3.20 (15) develop such programs as will aid in determining the compliance throughout the  
3.21 state with the provisions of this chapter, and in the furtherance of such duties, conduct  
3.22 research and study discriminatory practices based upon race, color, creed, religion, national  
3.23 origin, sex, age, disability, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, familial  
3.24 status, gender identity, sexual orientation, or other factors and develop accurate data on the

9.25 privileges, advantages, and accommodations of a place of public accommodation because  
9.26 of race, color, creed, religion, disability, national origin, marital status, gender identity,  
9.27 sexual orientation, or sex, or for a taxicab company to discriminate in the access to, full  
9.28 utilization of, or benefit from service because of a person's disability; or

9.29 (2) for a place of public accommodation not to make reasonable accommodation to the

10.12 building codes are not violations of this chapter and must be enforced under normal building  
10.13 code procedures.

10.15 Subdivision 1. **Access to public service.** It is an unfair discriminatory practice to

10.18 sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, or status with regard to public assistance or to fail  
10.19 to ensure physical and program access for disabled persons unless the public service can
