Bill Description

This bill would add a new prohibition to the cannabis packaging prohibitions provided by Minnesota Statutes section 342.62, subd. 3. The new prohibition would prohibit persons from selling, offering for sale, or facilitating the sale of empty packaging that, if used, would be a violation of section 342.62. The bill would provide the Attorney General's Office with authority to enforce this prohibition through section 8.31, which provides the Attorney General with pre-suit investigatory authority, as well as the authority to bring an enforcement action for injunctive relief, civil penalties, equitable relief, and its reasonable costs and fees for violations.

Assumptions

The Attorney General's Office does not project any defined expenditures, absorbed costs, or revenues from the bill's amendments to section 342.62. Investigations of alleged violations of section or litigation to enforce the bill's new packaging prohibition would be pursued by the Office's existing attorneys and investigators dedicated to consumer protection issues.

Litigation to enforce the bill's new packaging prohibition could generate revenue for the State because civil penalty recoveries must be deposited in the General Fund pursuant to Minnesota Statutes section 16A.151. However, recognizing the size, complexity, longevity, and risk inherent in consumer protection investigations and enforcement actions, it is not possible to project how much increased revenue may be generated from the bill's enforcement, nor in what future fiscal year such increased revenue may be realized.
