Dear Rep. Frazier, Sen. Westlin, Rep. Pryor, and Sen. Cwodzinski:

Thank you very much for inviting our organizations to participate in the recent SRO bill work group. We agree that no school staff may engage in the restraints or other conduct prohibited under Minnesota Statutes 121A.58, including prone restraint, for the purpose of protecting school property.

During our discussion on Friday, February 2, we were assured that Minnesota law permits a school staff member to physically stop a student who is damaging school property – and that the provisions regarding reasonable force enacted in 2023 or amended in the proposed bill do not prohibit school employees from stopping property damage.

We write to confirm that our understanding is correct. If possible, please share statutory authority that supports this understanding.

If our understanding is not correct, we greatly appreciate clarification so that we can determine how to proceed during next week's committee meetings.
