
## **LEGACY OF MINNESOTA'S WWII VETERANS**

## STEPS TAKEN BY THE MINNESOTA MILITARY & VETERANS MUSEUM (MMVM)

- ✓ MMVM and MN Navy League traveled to Washington D.C. to meet with Admiral Sam Cox, Naval History & Heritage Command
- √ MMVM sent a formal request to Admiral Cox requesting that a new loan agreement be written replacing MDVA with MMVM
- √ At the direction of Admiral Cox, his Registrar of Loans contacted MMVM to initiate a new loan agreement
- √ MMVM commissioned a conservation report for Ward Gun #3
- ✓ MMVM briefed staff of the Capitol Area Architecture and Planning Board
- ✓ MMVM briefed the Minnesota Historical Society
- ▼ MMVM collected additional research materials from Richard Klobuchar
- ▼ Final floorplan completed for MMVM's new 40,000 sq ft facility
- √ HF 4054 & SF 3884 introduced at the MN State Legislature
