Article 1: DISABILITY SERVICES

Section	S.F./Source	Description
1 to 3, 6 to 10, 18, 23 to 25 and 47 (a) and (c)	SF 5317 (Maye Quade)	Eliminates parental fees for families when a child is living in a children's residential facility (CRFs), a psychiatric residential treatment facility (PRTF), a residential treatment center (RTCs), or an Intermediate Care Facilities for persons with Developmental Disabilities (ICF/DD) and makes various conforming and technical changes.
4 and 31	SF 3733 , as modified (Utke)	Establishes a temporarily available exception to the moratorium on licensing new community residential settings.
5	SF 3809-1 , as modified (Boldon)	Modifies home and community-based services standards for out-of-home respite services for children
11 and 12	SF 5427 (Abeler)	Requires commissioner to give equal access to electronic visit verification system data to all electronic visit verification system vendors; permits weekly electronic documentation of certain service visits.
13, 15 and 17	SF 4955 (Abeler)	Modifies provisions related to MnCHOICES assessments, including making permanent an existing temporary exemption for certain assessments performed by contract assessors, extending timelines for responding to a request for an assessment, and allowing certain assessments to occur every three years rather than every year.
14 and 16	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48: modifies experience requirements for certified MnCHOICES assessors who are RNs and extending the validity of MnCHOICES assessments from 60 days to 365 days.
19, 45, and 47 (b)	Modified SF 2968 -A4 (Hoffman)	Increases the transitional supports allowance from \$3,000 to \$4,000

20, 21 and 35	SF 4420 (Mann)	Modifies provisions related to the consumer-directed community supports option, including increased disclosures to participants, limits on lead agencies discretion with respect to CDCS policy, and a direction to the commissioner to clarify certain policies regarding CDCS.
22	SF 3736-A1 (Rasmusson)	Modifies the rate encumbrance under DWRS to permit technology costs related to remote support to be included within the required encumbrances.
26	Modified SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48 modified: clarifies the requirements of requested recommendations and extends a due date for a report related to the provision of home care services and CFSS while a patient is in an acute care hospital.
27 and 28	Modified SF 4174 (Fateh)	Modifies the eligible applicants and allowable uses under the provider capacity grant for rural and underserved communities grant by allowing grant funds to be used to assist providers determine the most appropriate license and program to best serve their targeted population.
29 and 30	SF 5335-A29 (Hoffman)	Modifies the definition of “new Americans” for the purposes of the new American legal, social services, and long-term care workforce grant program, and modifies the eligible uses of grant funds.
32	Modified SF 3841-A1 (Maye-Quade)	Establishes the advisory task force on family residential services.
33	Modified SF 4268-A1 (Kupec)	Permits lead agencies to establish assistive technology partnerships to facilitate timely authorizations of allowable technology and assess the benefits of the use of technology among HCBS waiver recipients.
34	SF 5335-A16 (Fateh)	Directs the commissioner to provide information related to proposed rate increases for CFSS and related direct support programs and services.
36	SF 5335-A30 (Utke)	Directs the commissioner to submit waiver amendments related to eliminating the limit on prevocational services.
37	SF 4043-A1 (Hoffman)	Directs the commissioner of human services to draft legislative language proposing to permit CFSS

		support worker to work up to eight hours of overtime per week, provide overnight staffing, and work 80 consecutive hours.
38	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48 : permits provision of unit-based waiver services under certain conditions in an acute care hospital
39	SF 3894 (Boldon)	Requires the commissioner to contract for a continuous improvement study regarding access to disability services.
40	SF 5264 (Weber)	Establishes emergency relief grants for rural EIDBI providers
41	SF 5244-2A (Dibble)	Establishes the Legislative Task Force on Guardianship
42	SF 3840-A1 (Abeler)	Establishes the own home services provider capacity-building grant
43	SF 4094 (Maye Quade)	Establishes the pediatric hospital-to-home transition pilot project.
44	Modified SF 3634 (Abeler)	Permits state-only funding of PCA services provided by parents and spouses beginning October 1, 2024.
46	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48 : directs the commissioner to develop a Tribal vulnerable adult/developmental disability targeted case management service as a covered medical assistance benefit.
34	Combined Repealer	Repealers from SF 5317 (Maye Quade) related to eliminating parental fees and SF 2968 -A4 (Hoffman) and removing from statute waiver plan language related to transitional support allowances (note: the repealer from SF 2968-A4 does NOT repeal the transitional support allowance).

Section	S.F./Source	Description
1 and 13	SF 5335-A33 (Fateh)	Permits small assisted living facilities to relocate under specified conditions without obtaining a new ALF license; and exempts certain customized living providers providing services in a relocated ALF from the customized living moratorium and the tiered standards requirements for new customized living settings.

2 to 5	SF 1969-A5 , as modified (Housley)	Modifies food code requirements for small assisted living facilities; permits modified orientation and training requirements for employees who move between facilities owned or operated by the same entity.
6 and 7	SF 4296 (Hoffman) as amended by SF5335-A22 (Abeler)	Requires assisted living facilities to provide all staff with training related to de-escalation and mental illness.
8 and 9	SF 3575 (Maye Quade)	Modifies the caregivers of people with dementia respite grant program.
10 and 11	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48 : permitting transition planning in the alternative care program
12	Modified SF 1788-3A (Oumou Verbeten) and SF 1769 (Rasmusson)	Increases the property rate component for four nursing homes based on recent capital improvements to the facilities.
14	SF 4548 (Abeler)	Provides a property rate increase to a nursing facility in Minnetonka using statutorily appropriated money dedicated to nursing facility moratorium exception projects.
15 and 17	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-48 : establishes elderly waiver budget and rate exceptions for high-need participants and requires the commissioner to propose EW reforms to address the needs of older adults with high support needs.
16	Modified version of SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	AD-58 modified : rather than sunset the customized living rate floor, reduces the rate floor to \$145 per resident per day.

1	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	Gov. Proposal : adds the director of the office of addiction and recovery to the Opiate Epidemic Response Advisory Council as a nonvoting member
2	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	CF-41 : Modifies the opiate response fund allocation and allowable uses
3 (this section was placed in the wrong article)	SF 5335-A29 (Hoffman)	Establishes a grant program for certain home care providers to defray the cost of complying with electronic visit verification requirements.

Article 4: PRIORITY ADMISSIONS AND CIVIL COMMITMENT

1, 5, 7	SF 4460-A4 (Mann)	Modifies the priority admissions standards for patients being admitted to DCT programs from jails and correctional institutions, requires exceptions to the priority given to patients in jails and correctional institutions for 10 patients in community hospitals; and establishes a priority admissions review board to develop further recommendations regarding admissions to DCT programs and monitor implementation of the new prioritization standards.
2	New	Prohibits the closure of or modification of the population served by the community addiction recovery enterprise program in Carlton.
3	SF 3409-A1 , modified	Forgives the debt of Beltrami County and Todd County for certain cost of care payments.
4	SF 5249 (Rasmusson)	Establishes an engagement services pilot program in Otter Tail County
6	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	DC-41: establishes a civil commitment reform taskforce

Article 5: DIRECT CARE AND TREATMENT

Section	S.F./Source	Description
1 to 43	SF 5335 , as amended and further modified by the Revisor (Hoffman); and by SF 5335-A34 (Rasmusson)	DC-46: establishes Direct Care and Treatment as a separate agency; specifies the organization and requirements of the executive board; specifies that the CEO of DCT is appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Senate and serves as the chair of the board.

1	Modified SF 4387 (Oumou Verbeten)	Requires DCT to provide free communication under specified conditions to patients and clients of certain state-operated treatment programs.
2	Modified SF 3697 (Maye Quade)	Establishes a planning grant for implementation of a community care hub.

1	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	OP-50: Extends the carry forward authority of the appropriation for the financially distressed nursing facility loan program.
2	SF 4198 (Abeler)	Extends by one year the due date of an evaluation report related to the direct care services corps pilot project.
3	SF 5335 , as amended (Hoffman)	OP-50: Aligns the effective date of the new rates for substance use disorder treatment services with medications for opioid use disorder to align with the 2023 spreadsheet.
